WOOL MARKET

BOSTON, Apr. 30 (A) — Sales of wools covered a fairly wide variety of lines, but individual sales are mostly very moderate in volume, with purchases limited to immediate requirements. Original bags 64's and finer territory wools bring 60 to 61 cents scoured basis for choice lines, containing a fair percentage of strictly combing staple. Occasional sales are being closed on strictly combing 56's graded territory wools at 48 to 51c scoured basis.

Sharp Advance Pinches Bears In Wall Street

NEW YORK, Apr. 30 (A) — The stock market ended a month of declining prices with one of the sharpest advances of the year today, as bear traders found themselves pinched and bid actively to cover their short sales. There were numerous gains of 4 or more, and Auburn shot up nearly \$30.

A steady retreat of the bears, which began in the morning, became a stampede in the final transactions, and trading became so feverish the stock ticker could not keep up with transactions. After a rather sloppy showing in the first hour the market began to creep slowly upward. The advance was accelerated by reports that the Federal Reserve bank of New York might reduce its rediscount rate at the meeting of the directors late this afternoon.

Soon after midday the rally began to assume more important proportions and by the last hour it was running along under full steam. Trading was most active in the final dealings. Sales were in the neighborhood of 3,500,000 shares. U. S. Steel common, which dropped \$9 yesterday, soared more than \$5.

'GRAS PRICES BREAK TODAY IN PORTLAND

PORTLAND, Apr. 30 (A) — Wholesale butter and egg quotations opened unchanged today. Tone of the butter market was steady but receipts were critical buyers. Egg market remained weak with supplies more than needs. Country dressed meat and poultry markets opened steady.

Tillamook County Creamery association quoted its cheese at a 1 cent reduction, the lowest price level on Tillamook cheese since 1914. Quote: triplets, 15 cents; loaf, 10, f. o. b. Tillamook.

Outstanding conditions in the fresh fruit and vegetable trade were reported by government market news service as follows:

Asparagus prices broke badly at Portland today, as the result of increasing arrivals of home-grown grass from all districts—Canby, Beaverton, and Columbia river points. Eastern carlot demand is very good however, and most of the mid-Columbia production is now being loaded for eastern shipment.

Primary potato markets continue dull and weak. Temporary shortage at Los Angeles this week has resulted in the highest prices of the season however, with Oregon Burbanks jobbing in limited volume around \$1.60 @ \$1.65.

FAIL TO AGREE ON PRICE ASTORIA, Ore., April 30 (A)—Although the fishing season opens here tomorrow, packers and fishermen today had failed to reach an agreement on price.

Fishermen have refused to sign contracts and the situation is becoming tense. Observers see the packers united in their demands, while the fishermen's union at a meeting last night adopted a resolution urging all members to "stick together" and sell to the highest bidder.

CURB MARKET BULLISH NEW YORK, Apr. 30 (A) — One of the most vigorous upturns in months swept over the curb market this afternoon, bringing net gains of one to three points in most of the active shares. Advances in numerous specialties were much larger. Shorts were pressed to cover in the late trading which was the day's most active period. Electric Bond and Share, American Super-Power, United Light & Power, Radio, Swift International, Standard Oil of Ohio and numerous others were up two to three points net. Standard of Indian and Cities Service rose a point or more.
