Portland and Walter Mails Win From Reds 4 to 1 - Freak Hit Scored.

(By The Associated Press) Portland defeated the Mission Reds 4 to 1 at Portland, Walter Mails, Beaver hurler, blanking the Missions until the ninth inning. The first Portland score, in the seventh, came on a fluke. Johnson fell flat to save himself from a high, inside one batted by Caster. As he fell the ball struck his bat. 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Ferrell's Feat First In Majors Since May 8, 1929

The New Yorkers have dropped four of their last five, with only a 14-inning tie to break the monopoly. They gained an early four-run lead off Lloyd Brown yesterday, but four pitchers couldn't hold it.

Chicago's White Sox tied their previous high run for the year by making it two straight over Detroit, 3 to 0. They grouped their five hits off Whitehill, while Thomas kept seven Tiger blows well spaced. Inclement weather stopped the Athletics and Red Sox for the fourth straight day at Boston.

St. Louis and Chicago continued their red-hot argument over the leadership of the National league, and it still is a dead heat. Both won their eighth victory in eleven starts, the Cardinals taking Pittsburgh, 7 to 1, and the Cubs downing Cincinnati, 3 to 1. There were only the two games, rain preventing play at New York and Philadelphia.

Making his second start of the year for the Cards, Jess Haines limited the Pirates to four scattered hits, while his mates got to Kremer and Osborn for 12. Adams and Orsatti each had a double and single.

The Cubs nicked Red Lucas for only seven hits, but bunched four of them in the fifth inning to score all their runs. Right Stephenson rapped a double and single. The Reds couldn't realize on their eleven blows off the rookie, Ed Baecht.

- By Mrs. Alexander George. MAY DESSERT CAKE. Breakfast. Chilled Prunes. Poached Eggs. Buttered Toast. Coffee. Luncheon. Minced Chicken Sandwiches. Pickles. Sugar Cookies. Peach Sauce. Tea. Dinner. Spanish Rice. Buttered Turnips. Bread. Butter. Fruit Salad. Coffee. May Dessert Cake.

- Spanish Rice (Serving 6). 4 slices bacon, cut fine. 3 tablespoons chopped onions. 2 tablespoons chopped green peppers. 3 cups boiled rice. 2 cups tomatoes. 1/2 teaspoon salt. 1/2 teaspoon paprika. Heat bacon in frying pan. Add seasonings and rice and cook until browned. Stir frequently. Add the tomatoes. Boil gently 10 minutes.

- May Dessert Cake. 4 tablespoons butter. 1/2 cup sugar. 3 egg yolks, beaten. 6 tablespoons milk. 1 teaspoon lemon extract. 1/2 teaspoon vanilla. 1/2 teaspoon salt. 1 cup flour. 1 teaspoon baking powder. Cream the butter and sugar. Mix well. Add rest of ingredients and beat 3 minutes. Pour into shallow pan which has been lined with waxed paper. Bake 20 minutes in moderate oven. Add the topping. Topping: 1-3 cup sugar. 3 tablespoons flour. 1 egg yolk. 1/2 teaspoon salt. 1/2 cup water. 2 tablespoons lemon juice. 1 tablespoon grated lemon rind. 1 teaspoon butter. Blend the sugar and flour. Add rest of ingredients. Cook in double boiler until thick and creamy. Stir constantly. Beat well and pour onto the baked cake mixture. Cover with Meringue. 4 egg whites. 1/2 cup sugar. 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon. 1/2 teaspoon lemon extract. Beat the eggs until stiff. Add the sugar and beat until creamy. Add the extract and roughly spread over top of cooked mixture. Sprinkle with the cinnamon. Bake 15 minutes in slow oven. While warm cut into bars and remove carefully from pan.
