

Butter Market Is Distinctly Firmer

PORTLAND, May 1 (AP)—Wholesale butter market was distinctly firmer today due to shipping demand to fill California orders. Limited supplies forced buyers to pay premiums on all grades and receipts were closely held. Quotations held unchanged although San Francisco and Los Angeles markets advanced 1 and 2 cents respectively Thursday. Wholesale egg market remained weak with moderate receipts more than sufficient to demand. Quotations were unchanged but irregular price shading was common. Early trading in country dressed meats and poultry moved slowly at barely steady quotations. Supplies in all lines were fully ample for the light demand evidenced. Price declines predominated in the government market news service report of conditions in the fresh fruit and vegetable trade.

23,000,000 Bushels Wheat Delivered

MINNEAPOLIS, May 1 (AP)—Approximately 23,000,000 bushels of wheat were delivered to the Farmers' National Grain corporation today in what traders said was the largest single day's grain transaction in Minnesota history. The wheat, representing payment of approximately \$18,000,000, was delivered to the Farmers' National Grain corporation, federal farm board ally, as May futures contracts came due. Little of the money goes to farmers, grain men said. Owners of the grain for the most part were grain commission firms and terminal elevator companies which purchased it previously from northwest farmers. Most of the wheat was in elevators here and in Duluth. The wheat was accepted by the farmers' national for the account of the Grain Stabilization corporation.

To Export Wheat Through Seattle

SEATTLE, May 1 (AP)—Storage facilities for 1,500,000 bushels of bulk and 850,000 bushels of sacked wheat, have been obtained here by the Farmers' National Grain corporation which completed negotiations for the lease of the Hanford street elevator of the Seattle port commission. The corporation took the elevator over today with the announcement it expects to export ten million bushels of wheat a year through Seattle.

Lake Now Holds 9 Feet of Water Over Low Level

ENTERPRISE, Ore., May 1 (Special)—The water in Wallace lake now stands at 9 feet above low level, according to the Record-Chief. Last year at this time the gauge registered 10.40 feet, and the maximum height last spring was 14.55 feet. However the run-off from the mountains started April 7 last year and by the last of the month much of the lighter snow had melted and the water had reached the valley. This spring the run-off has not started. Temperature here has been mild but not high, and a glance at the mountain ridge shows the great expanse of unbroken snow covering all the higher regions. This gives promise of much more water in the lake than was ever gathered in 1930.

The spring snow survey, the last of the season, was finished by Glen Jacob, acting watermaster, last Friday. It shows 5 1/2 feet of snow at Enterprise and Hermiston, and 1 1/2 feet on upper Bear creek, with heavy water content in all areas. No comparable quantity of snow is found in any other mountains in Oregon east of the Cascades, and many ranges report no snow at all. The spring run-off has cleared the mountains already, and there is fear of shortage for irrigation and stock use. SEEK MILLION 'BORROWED' AS ADVANCE PAY

SAN FRANCISCO, May 1 (AP)—The Examiner said today two groups in San Francisco and Los Angeles representing stockholders and creditors of the Richfield Oil company and its subsidiary, the Universal Consolidated Oil company, were seeking to trace more than \$1,000,000 allegedly "borrowed" from Richfield as "salary advances" by its officers, directors and employees, and 1,300,000 allegedly "borrowed" by Richfield from its subsidiary. The paper said the investigation had gone to a head with the filing of a report in the United States district court at Los Angeles by W. C. McDuffie, receiver in equity for Richfield, and the announcement that Richfield would default interest payments due today on its bonds. McDuffie also stated in his report, the paper said, that because of "lack of knowledge of the collectability" of the notes given to secure the debt, he had put them down on his list of assets at \$1 each, regardless of the amount "borrowed." He said the issue regarding collectability would probably be settled in court.
