By Johnny Farrell As told to Alan Gould NO. 1—THE STANCE The proper stance for the drive is with the knees relaxed, slightly bent.

This makes it easy to develop the relaxed body pivot. Stiffness at the ankles, with the feet too far apart, makes it impossible to pivot properly.

Relax, too, on the follow-through. Do not stiffen up at the finish. The fullness and ease of the follow-through is a factor in giving power and distance.

Do not sacrifice the accuracy of the shot, however, by too much stress on distance. Too often the player loses control off the tee by the desire to sting the ball out of sight.

It doesn't pay to try to kill the ball, either off the tee, or in an attempt to make up for ground lost by a poor shot.

And now the battle between Sharkey and Primo Carnera, to be held at Ebbets Field June 10, weather and courts permitting, is officially designated as being for the heavyweight championship of the world.
