No. 5—HOW TO TRAIN
The three most important factors for a competitive golfer, if he is to stick around the top, are:

1. Proper conditioning.
2. The right diet.
3. Relaxation—to keep the proper frame of mind.

It's not like training for a prize fight. Boxers harden their muscles. That's one reason why Dempsey and Tunney are not good golfers.

In golf, soft, flexible muscles are essential to keep the necessary looseness in the swing and pivot. Abdominal muscles must be developed for strength.

The arms and hands—especially the hands—are important. I know some great golfers who flex their hand muscles with spring weights, the way Tunney used to do.

I give Artie McGovern's training system credit for putting me in good condition. He directed my dieting and exercise, strengthened my stomach and abdomen.

Before a big tournament it is important for a player to know just how much golf to play and how to reach the "peak" at the right time. This was one of the secrets of Bobby Jones' success. He had the faculty for coming to a big tournament in prime condition.

Another vital thing is relaxation while a tournament is on, or at other times, for that matter. Some fellows relax with a few drinks after a day's tournament play or a hard match.

A shower and a massage afterwards for me what a drink may do for some. I feel thoroughly relaxed afterward.

Beyond that there should be some way to shake off the grind in play or amusement. We don't all like the same things. Music and dancing, or a good movie, help take my mind off the strain of an important tournament.

Walter Hagen likes to have a crowd around for a good time. He also likes shooting and fishing. Gene Sarazen gets his relaxation out of motorcycling or mixing with a crowd. He's a good story teller. Leo Diegel and Bill Mehlhorn ease off by playing bridge.

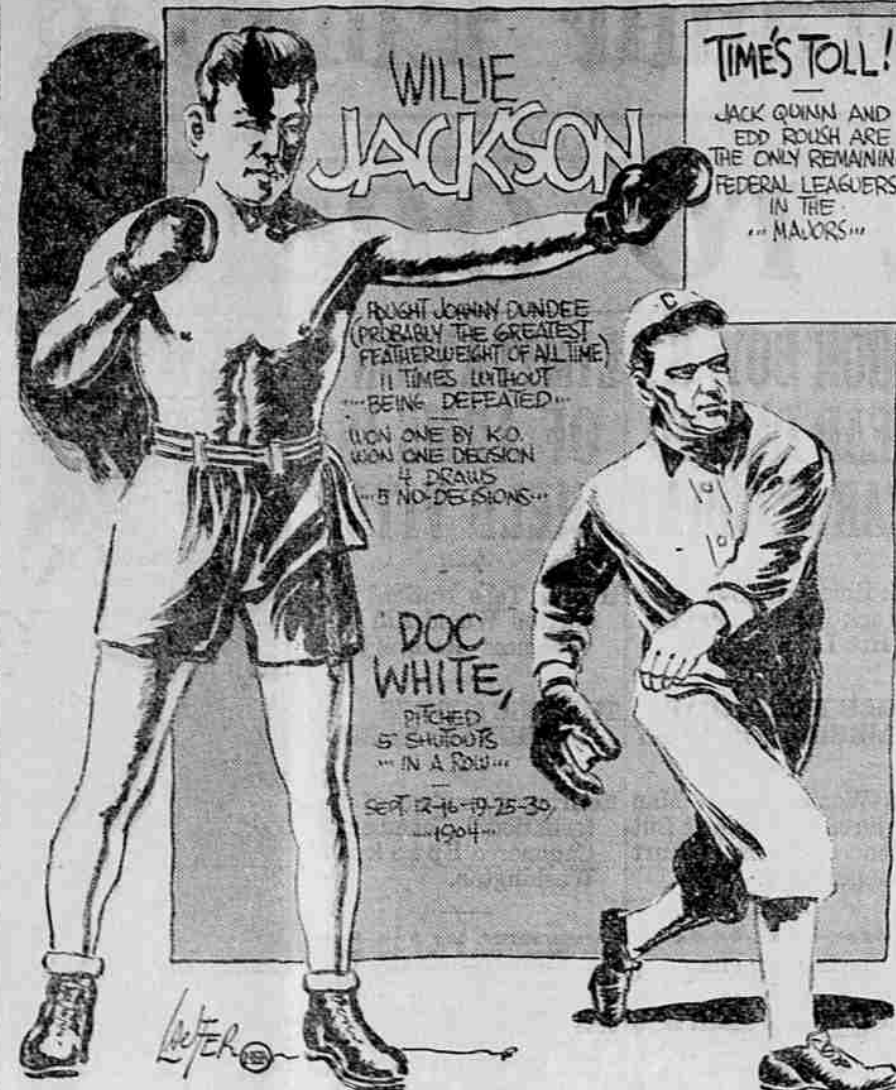
VANCOUVER BARRICKS WIN

TEAM WINNER
FROM MEXICO

MEXICO CITY, May 4 (AP)—The fine trio of tennis players representing the United States were a step nearer the Davis Cup finals today as a result of a sweeping victory over Mexico, but they had to share some of the honors of their first tie with a young opponent, Ricardo Tapia.

Tapia, only 20 years old and lacking the tournament experience which made the rivals almost unbeatable, played with brilliance that threatened to cause trouble for the United States players as they swept through the North American zone final by winning three straight matches.

In singles and doubles, Tapia could not even win a set, but he succeeded in making his team hard for his rivals.

Tennis followers agreed that the final tie Mexican showed great promise for future Davis Cup battles.

The United States team, after completing its matches here, will face Canada in the zone final at Montreal May 21, 22 and 23.

Manitoba Premier Asks Grain Board

WINNIPEG, May 4 (AP)—Premier John Brown of Manitoba advocates a government grain marketing board to regulate the grain trade.

He said in an address Friday night that grain growers of the province should unite behind a plan to prevent dumping of the 1931 crop immediately after the harvest.

The government board would be of little use, however, he warned, unless during its life the grain producers would get along with the government.

The earth rolled gently and the ball dropped in the hole. Although seismographs registered only one two-thousandth of an inch, the tremor alarmed thousands in this vicinity. Minor damage was done to smaller buildings but no one was injured.

FOCATTELLO, Idaho, May 4 (AP)—M. J. Clark, 33, shot and killed Larry Clark, 40, after a quarrel in the Clark apartment here Saturday, and shortly afterward committed suicide, the police announced after an investigation.

Mrs. Clark told officers her husband came home intoxicated and demanded that she summon him on the telephone. She complied, and also called the police.

When officers arrived they found Larry had been slain. About 30 minutes later Clark shot and killed himself on Arthur street, in the town's district.

Diamond Merchant's
Body Found in Sea

NEW YORK, May 4 (AP)—Search for a diamond merchant, who disappeared six weeks ago with \$20,000 of his stock, came to an end Saturday and police turned instead to the job of finding his slayer.

The body of Abraham H. Levy was found by a boatman near the Long Island sound breakwater at Glen Cove, 1,000 yards out from the shore-front estate of the late Marcus Loew.

The body was riddled with bullets and wire was around the neck, arms and legs. An autopsy established that it had been in the water for some time, and that the shots were fired by a 32 caliber revolver at close range.

Identification was made from dental plates. Relatives claimed the body.

A reward of \$1,000 will go to Jack Block, boatman at Glen Cove.

MILWAUKEE BOWLER WINS

An examination indicated he had been dead only a short time. Officers said he was apparently ambushed.

The body bore marks of many shot gun slugs.

Scott Heads G.O.P.
Newspaper Bureau

WASHINGTON, May 4 (AP)—Charles F. Scott, editor of the Iowa (Kau.) Register, will become chief of the weekly and farm newspaper bureau for the Republican national committee today.

Scott's editorial experience dates back to 1882. From 1901 to 1911 he served in congress and for a time, was chairman of the house agriculture committee.

Women Bowlers

Whether or not woman's place is in the bowling alleys, the evidence is that feminine interest has developed to a substantial degree in this popular sport.

So much so that Mrs. R. J. McCutcheon of Pueblo, Colo., was persuaded by the bowling interests to make a country-wide tour after she had attracted attention by beating the one time world's champion, Jimmy Smith, from scratch.

Three years ago Mrs. McCutcheon bowled a string of 240, 234 and 224 to defeat Smith by 704 to 686 at Denver. She had been bowling only two years when she accomplished this extraordinary victory for her sex.

"Women," says Mrs. McCutcheon, "are handicapped in bowling by not having the strength of men. Rolling a 16 pound mineralite ball is not like playing ping pong. But what women lack in strength they can make up in accuracy. The ball I use has medium speed. A 225 score for a woman is equal to a 250 score for a man."

Mrs. McCutcheon is 35 years old. Her best three game total is 817, made in practice, but she once averaged 245 for 12 straight games in competition, which is good enough to beat 9,999 out of every 10,000 male bowlers, if not all of them.
