NO. 7—BUNKER SHOTS Joe Average Golfer makes more needless hard work for himself trying to get out of traps than perhaps any other feature of the game. Bunker shots are subject to change because of the wide range of circumstances under which they may have to be made, but I would set forth these few general, simple principles in this use of the niblick: 1. Stand close to the ball. 2. Get a good, firm footing. 3. Lay the club back. 4. Use the wrists, with no pivot. 5. Keep the head down. If you have ever noticed Bobby Jones, you know how easy an explosion shot can look. Just a flick of the wrists, with the club faced away back, the head going from the outside inward, to give the necessary "cut."

Young Max Baer Is Defeated By Veteran Risko

CLEVELAND, May 6 (AP)—Young Max Baer, the famous Californian, had another reverse to show today in his heavyweight campaign. The Los Angeles lad found the experience of the veteran Johnny Risko too much for him last night and lost a 10-round decision to the one-time Cleveland boxer.

Risko, fighting for the fourth time in five weeks, was wanted in the close milling, but did the most damage at long range. He pummeled away at Max's head throughout the fight, with the Californian concentrating on a stiff body attack. They clinched frequently in the closing rounds, and Risko, who was the Cleveland favorite in breaking away. The crowd boomed when Baer wrestled Risko to the floor in the eighth and again in the twelfth, but each time the Clevelander came back with two-faced rallies.

Newspaper men gave Risko the second, third and last three rounds, with the fourth even and the rest going to Baer. The Californian drove Risko into retreat in the third with another barrage of rights and had the Clevelander reeling temporarily in the fifth. Risko got his left working, however, as the battle wore on and his staying power enabled him to weather the hardest of the Californian's rushes. Despite his recent defeat by Tommy Loughran and Ernie Schaaf, Baer went into the fight a slight favorite. Baer, who weighed 204, had a nine-pound advantage.

The fight was to the liking of more than 7000 persons who paid \$15.00 to watch the public ball bill. One of the interested spectators was Max Baer, who had just defended his championship against "Yonnie" Stribling here July 3.

ROSENBLUM TRIMS LOMSKI IN PORTLAND

PORTLAND, Ore., May 6 (AP)—Maxie Rosenbloom, light heavyweight boxing champion, had too much speed for Leo Lomski and took a 10-round decision over the American amateur here last night. While no great damage was done, Rosenbloom showed too many gloves and was too fast on his feet for Leo to get anywhere. Lomski reached the New Yorker with some jarring punches that hurt in the second and third rounds, but from and after the third Rosenbloom got into action and carried the fight to the ever-widening Lomski.

Each boxer weighed 175½ pounds. After being dropped for a count of nine in the first round, Jack Sparks, Portland heavyweight, came back in the second to knock out Bill Vogel, Salem. It was a fast and furious affair. Sparks ended the match with right opponents to Vogel's chin. In the semi-windup Frank McGabe, Seattle middleweight, out-boxed Red Rader, San Francisco, to a fast six-round decision.

Eed Thigley, Seattle, heavyweight, took a six round decision with ease from Joe Holloway, The Dalles. Hank Zamora, Portland heavyweight, knocked out Ted Dempsey, Spokane, in the last of a four-round preliminary filled with blood and thunder.

IRA DERN WINS FROM KRUSE IN ROUGH MATCH

SPOKANE, May 6 (AP)—Ira Dern, Salt Lake City heavyweight won two out of three falls from Bob Kruse, Portland, in a rough house main event wrestling match here last night. Dern weighed 205 pounds, Kruse 200.

Dern got his first fall in the third round with a body slam that came after two minutes 27 seconds of tusseling. Kruse was knocked groggy, but recovered in the rest period and clamped on one of his deadly wrist locks to take the second fall after a minute and 56 seconds of the fourth round.

Dern won the match by escaping from a series of wrist locks and hurling Kruse to the canvas with a modified body slam after a minute of the fifth round.

Charles Mason, Longview, Wash., light heavyweight took the odd fall from Tom Ray, Portland, to win the semi-windup match. Mason won his first fall in the second round by a knockout, and his second in the fifth with a body slam. Ray won his fall in the third round with a leg lock. Ray weighed 175 pounds, Mason 180.

They saw him for the second time yesterday when he hit a homer in the sixth and then tripled in the ninth to drive in the score that licked the Phils again, 5 to 4.

The big outfielder, who hit .377 for Los Angeles last season, has been riding the bench ever since the Braves got home from the south. The report got out that he couldn't hit a curve ball. Evidently the Phils forgot to serve him benders in the last two games.

Two "Hot" Recruits If Schullmerich can maintain anything like the pace he set in his league debut, the Braves can claim a

pair of the year's outstanding newcomers. The other is Robert "Red" Worthington, the left fielder obtained from Rochester, who has been hitting in cleanup position. He also got one out of the park yesterday, tying the score and paving the way for Schullmerich's winning punch. Buzz Arlett hit his fourth homer of the year in the third, when the Phils scored all their runs off Tom Zachary.

The National league race tightened around the top as the Giants made it two straight from Brooklyn, 8 to 0, and the Cardinals were idle for the second time. Only a half-game separated them today. Freddie Fitzsimmons held the Robins to three hits.

Chicago's Cubs clung to third place by downing Cincinnati again, 8 to 4. They scored all their runs in the first three innings off Foy and Benton. Sweetland's lead was never in danger.

Indians Stay at Top Cleveland held its two-game advantage over the field by outscoring the St. Louis Browns, 11 to 6. Burnett, Averill and Fonseca led a 17-hit assault on three Brown pitchers, the latter hitting a homer.

Long distance hitting and Urban Faber's fine relief hurrying featured the White Sox 7 to 3 victory over Detroit. Faber allowed only one hit and no runs after relieving Praiser in the fifth inning. The Sox collected 11 hits off three Tigers, including four triples and three doubles.
