## Iverson Murder Case Solution Is Farther Away

SALEM, May 7 (AP)—Solution of the H. J. Iverson murder case at Silverton, 15 miles northeast of here, appeared further from solution yesterday than ever, Marion county officials indicated. The slayer or slayers of the night officer, who was shot through the head early Saturday, were still as large as clues after clues failed of definite accomplishment.

Officers were still holding Lester H. and S. E. Irvingham, arrested Monday night, but credence in their connection with the murder was apparently waning. The two were being held on charges of carrying concealed weapons. They were taken into custody when found with loaded revolvers.

It was further reported at the sheriff's office there was little hope of finding anything tangible on the information from Silverton yesterday that two men were seen to recover an object, believed to be a rifle, from a field near the scene of the crime.

Finger prints on the T. E. Sims car, abandoned in The Dalles after it had been stolen from Salem the night of the murder failed to correspond to those of the Irvingham brothers, Deputy District Attorney Lyle Page informed local officials last night. Page was in The Dalles investigating the theft of the car. The finger prints were sent to Portland to be used in further inspection.

Funeral services for Iverson were held at Silverton yesterday.

## ATTEMPTING TO RIGHT TROUBLE WITH FOKKERS

WASHINGTON, May 7 (AP)—Commerce department and Fokker aircraft officials here continued their efforts to work out maintenance problems for the 35 Fokker F-10 and F-10-A airplanes barred from passenger carrying, with prospects that some means of removing the ban would be found shortly.

Both Anthony H. G. Fokker, veteran designer, and Assistant Secretary Young in charge of aeronautics, said they felt that the problems would be satisfactorily solved shortly.

Meanwhile, service on the airlines affected by the order continued with such of the ships, built in 1929, as are being flown, carrying only mail and freight. Passengers are carried on ships of other models.

Transcontinental and Western Air, Inc., through its president, Harris M. Hanshute, announced that its schedule had not been interfered with in any way. Other equipment was reassigned and even a new service from New York to Chicago inaugurated last Friday, was carried out.

The company, Hanshute said, took the banned models entirely out of service and will not put them back until the department has approved them. His concern, he said, was using only seven of the 1929-built ships at the time, all on the Los Angeles-Kansas City route. He added that the company learned in advance of the order and replaced the ships on Saturday, two days before the order became public.

Fokker in a brief statement issued at the close of conferences with department officials, asserted he was "fighting for my reputation."

"Fokker ships will not be swept from the sky," he declared.

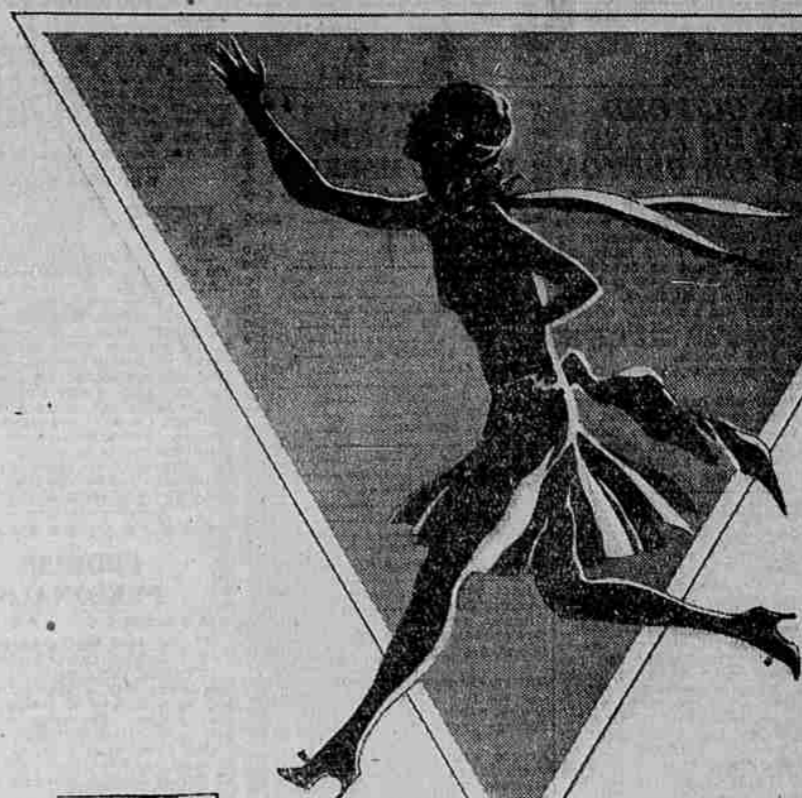

## Indians Dance In Ceremonies Of Thanksgiving

LEWISTON, Idaho, May 7 (AP)—Tune-toms boomed yesterday for the Indian Spring Thanksgiving dances, red tribesmen pluming themselves with eagle feathers as the cherry and apple trees burst into blossom.

Tomorrow the Nez Perce begin their annual chant of gratitude to Manitou for making flowers to bloom, salmon to come, carna roots to sprout and snow to vanish.

Other Northwest tribes celebrated the "Chinook charm" early, for the winter brought little snow and ice. The Nez Perce dance again this year on the old celebration ground

whence they were driven long ago, to mark their thanksgiving for the spring, feeling that white people choose the wrong time — the ugly winter.

Whites Celebrate Also  
They came back because the whites have their own spring fete now — the cherry blossom festival. Coming from ordinary lives as overcalled farmers, Indians brought ceremonial buckskins and feathers, and set up wickiups and painted teepees.

The Nez Perce, once the great Indian tribe of Horse Indiana, call it the Ka-ou-it. The Colvilles, Coeur d'Alenes, Spokanes and San Poles call it the "Chinook."

These latter tribes set up tall poles, around which the dancers step high to the drum's dry thump and shrill chanting. The prayers are simple, asking the deity to bring the spring, warm winds and good food. Dancers wear leather shirts and

leggings, strips of fur and bells. Some tribes the drums and poles, others forbid war bonnets.

Medicine men, who once directed the dances, are a vanishing "profession" now, and even the oldest Indians are forgetting the simple rites.

Since the spring dances have rarely included more sophisticated amusements such as gambling and drinking.

The law has never frowned upon them as on some other redskin festivals.
