Mrs. Kinzel's scores were 65 strokes, 12 handicap and 83 net. Mrs. Williams planted the flag in the cup on the 19th green, and Mrs. Kinzel planted her's in the middle of the 19th fairway. 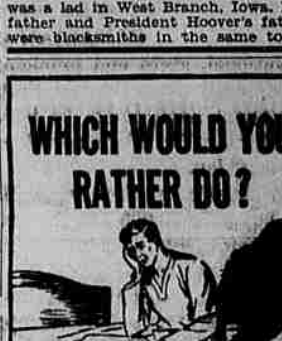
FALL DOWN SHAFT FATAL
