Ferrell started against the Boston Red Sox yesterday and retired voluntarily in the first inning after giving three doubles. He complained of a sore arm.

Bucky Lawless Wins Decision From Thompson

CHICAGO, May 9 (AP)—Young Jack Thompson, Oakland, Cal., negro, is still the waterweight champion of the world, but he has yet to defeat Bucky Lawless of Auburn, N. Y.

Thompson last night dropped a 10-round decision to the rough easterner in the final bout of the Chicago stadium's first "big top" show, his second defeat by Lawless. The first one occurred before Thompson won the title from Jackie Fields more than a year ago.

Thompson's title was not on the block, however, as he had forced Lawless to come in over the limit.

The verdict was popular with the crowd of 11,240, but was somewhat of a surprise to ring-side experts who figured the sharp-punching negro had gained a distinct edge in seven of the 10 rounds.

Attempts for revenge were more successful for a pair of Chicago boxers, King Levinisky, the swinging westsider, and Harry Dublinsky, a promising young lightweight.

Levinisky outmailed Emmett Rocco, Ellwood City, Pa., heavyweight in another 10-rounder, to wipe out a defeat attributed him a week ago.

Dublinsky employed an accurate straight left to defeat Tommy Grogan of Omaha, Neb., in 8 rounds, to square up for a decision victory previously won by Grogan.

Huskies Defeat O. S. C. Team In Corvallis Friday

CORVALLIS, Ore., May 9 (AP)—The team of Washington track team today had another dual track meet victory over Oregon State college, to the Huskies won here yesterday, 83 1-3 to 47 2-3.

The Huskies not only defeated the Beavers but established a new Northwest record of 3:29.7 in the mile relay.
