UNION, Ore., May 9 (Special) — The Baker county court yesterday approved an appropriation of \$100 for the Eastern Oregon Livestock show to be held here next month, the money to be used in promoting the work of the 4-H club and the Future Farmers of America.

G. I. Hess, president of the Union commercial club, and Mayor C. L. Cadwell, together with Herbert Chandler, president of the stock show association, conferred with members of the Baker county court yesterday and succeeded in securing the appropriation, which has been pending for some time.

Baker county has assured the association its hearty support in connection with the June show, and merchants have contributed liberally toward premiums.

Mr. Cadwell has been invited to give a 10-minute talk next Tuesday at the meeting of the Union county chamber of commerce at Island City, his subject to be "The Stock Show."

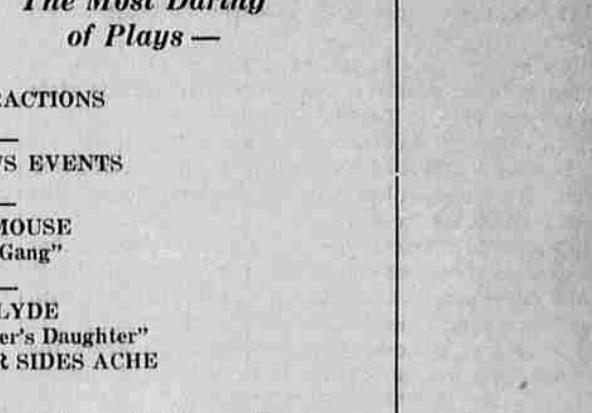
