Historic Truth on Joan of Arc To Be Sought By French Savants

ROUEN, France (AP)—Whether the story of Joan of Arc is true or false is to be searched by a committee of historians in this city of her martyrdom.

The savants are to assemble in a building fronting the market place where the Maid of Orleans was burned at the stake on May 30, 1431, their meeting being part of the memorial observance by which the city will commemorate in the week beginning May 23, the 500th anniversary of her death.

Historians have expressed varied views on the life history of the peasant girl who saved the throne of France for Charles VII. Manuscripts old and new have been scrutinized and an effort made to gather the most eminent students of fifteenth century history to discuss disputed points in her history.

Gabriel Hanotiaux of the French Academy, who has written one of the histories of the maid, and is looked upon as an authority on her, is to preside at the 70 years.

While this discussion is being held, the city will be re-enacting the events which led up to her execution. One of the chief of these will be a reproduction in faithful detail of the grand entry which King Charles made to the city after his victory at Orleans had saved his throne.

Another will be a 50-man procession the evening of May 29 from Joan of Arc tower, where the maid was imprisoned, to St. Ouen's church.

It will be followed by religious exercises in the market place at the spot where she was executed. The hour of her death will be observed next day by a solemn high mass in the cathedral.

Customers and pageant directors have been busy for weeks preparing for this pageant and every detail has been worked out to the limit of historical accuracy.

World Chamber Seeks to Solve Silver Situation

WASHINGTON, May 9 (AP)—The resolutions committee of the International Chamber of Commerce yesterday approved a resolution proposing a world conference on the depressed price of silver.

The resolution, submitted by a special committee of representatives from the interested nations, was approved without change. It was expected to reach a vote in the plenary session of the chamber today.

The resolution follows: "The International Chamber of Commerce, realizing the serious consequences of the present silver situation to the economic condition of the world, considers the convocation during the current year, of a conference for the purpose of seeking a solution to the problem, at which all interested bodies may be heard, to be eminently desirable, and urges the national governments to bring the matter to the attention of their respective governments."

The resolutions committee acted on the measure yesterday after Sir Arthur Balfour, head of the British delegation, had given it his approval.

Winnipeg Banker Fatally Wounded

WINNIPEG, Man., May 8 (AP)—Bank Manager P. B. R. Tucker was shot and fatally wounded by one of three bandits who robbed the Dominion bank of Canada here of between \$6000 and \$7000 today. Tucker apparently did not hear the order of the bandits to throw up his hands, said other members of the bank staff who were held up.

FEAR MAN IS DROWNED

PORTLAND, Ore., May 8 (AP)—Fear that E. L. McKenzie, Portland attorney, may have drowned in Oswego lake yesterday, was expressed by friends and relatives today. The harbor patrol undertook to drag the lake.

McKenzie left his office late yesterday and announced he was going to his cottage at the lake. He had an appointment to meet Mr. and Mrs. Elmer Johnson there later in the day. They investigated when he failed to appear, and found his clothing in the house. A swimming suit was missing.

Armor Tells of Giant Armadillos Once Denizens of Florida Jungles

BRADENTON, Fla. (AP)—An extinct beast armored like a miniature war tank moved through the Florida jungles 40,000 years ago. It was the giant armadillo, whose hide was bite-proof.

Parts of its armor, and bones and teeth have been discovered here by Walter W. Holmes, field worker in paleontology for the American Museum of Natural History, and his associate, James E. Moore of Sarasota. This is the first specimen ever found of a new genus of armadillo, and has been named *Holmesia Septentrionalis*, in honor of Mr. Holmes.

The hard, bony plates that covered the giant armadillo's back were flexible as the chain mail of King Arthur's knights. When danger threatened the animal could roll up in a ball that was tough enough to discourage even the saber-toothed tiger, which also lived in Florida in those days.

Including its tail the giant armadillo must have been nearly as long as a large round as a man, says Holmes. Its teeth show that it was a vegetarian. They have flat surfaces for grinding food instead of points for biting.

The giant armadillo died out, perhaps because the Florida climate did not remain warm enough to produce the food it needed. It is suggested by Barnum Brown, curator of fossil reptiles at the museum, that there are no armadillos in Florida today.

The ancestors of the giant armadillo, scientists believe, migrated from South America to Florida after the isthmus of Panama rose from the sea and connected the continents a million or more years ago.

More Earthquakes Near Napier, N. Z.

WELLINGTON, New Zealand, May 8 (AP)—Repeated earthquakes were experienced during the night in the neighborhood of Gisborne, 83 miles from Napier. Residents of the area were panic stricken and rushed into the open.

More than one hundred shocks were felt in the township of Tiniroto and many families deserted their homes and camped in the streets. There were several severe tremors at Waikare where some buildings were damaged.

Dean of Physicists Is Growing Weaker

PASADENA, Cal., May 8 (AP)—Dr. Albert Michelson, dean of American physicists has grown steadily weaker since he lapsed into a coma yesterday. Dr. Walter Bliss, attending physician, said early today his death was expected momentarily.

It was his ambition to make an accurate measurement of the speed of light as his final contribution to science. More than two years ago he finished "light with a mirror" from mountain top to mountain top near here and completed his computations, later a slight error was discovered.

"When I complete this experiment," he said last December, "I'll rest on my oars."

THOMAS ASKS STATEMENTS OF CARRIERS

SALEM, May 8 (AP)—Charles M. Thomas, public utilities commissioner today ordered the Southern Pacific company, Oregon-Washington Railroad and Navigation company, Oregon Short Line Railroad company, Oregon Electric R.R. Co. & N. R. Co., the Great Northern and Northern Pacific terminal company, all railroads operating within the state, to submit statements of money expended for advertising.

The commissioner requested this information be in his hands by June 10. Not only the amounts spent for advertising, but for what purposes and the necessity and reasons for it. The information is to be used in the commissioner's investigation of utility advertising.

General Butler Is Ill of Cold Today

PHILADELPHIA, May 8 (AP)—Major General Seward Butler of the marine corps, is back at his headquarters in Quantico, Va., under orders from a physician to rest a bit. The general is a recent cold which settled in his throat and Dr. Elwood R. Kirby of this city, advised him to remain at Quantico until he recovered.

Starting Highway In Siuslaw Forest

MARSHFIELD, Ore., May 9 (AP)—Actual construction on the highway from Powers to the Johnson Creek mining country in the Siuslaw national forest will begin immediately. Four carloads of equipment were unloaded at Powers Thursday for the Pepper Brothers Mining company.

The road will be built along the route of the long-contemplated Grants Pass link, constituting the first definite step toward development of that project.

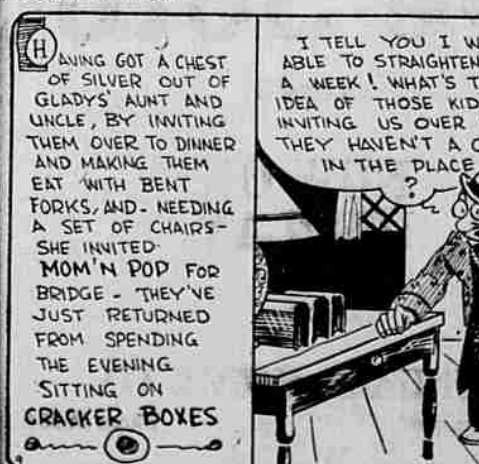
