Young Communists' International Is Losing Membership

MOSCOW, May 11 (AP)—The young Communists' International, composed of groups between the ages of 18 and 22 was described today in a published report to the Communist International as losing membership in foreign countries.

The young comrades deserted the ranks in large numbers in America, England, France, Italy, Sweden, Yugoslavia and Finland. It was said, "because of the anti-Communist campaign and strict party discipline which ousted many because of their failure to follow the party line."

Excepting Russia, China and Mongolia the report showed a membership of 62,000 in sixteen legal sections and 36,000 in 36 sections existing illegally in countries which have banned the organization.

The membership increased in China, Czechoslovakia and Mongolia while in the soviet state new members totalled more than a million, the report stated.
