PEACE OFFICERS OF TEN COUNTIES IN SESSION HERE

(Continued from Page One)

Robert V. Christman, district attorney of Enterprise, was admitted to membership in the organization. Several peace officers from all branches of the service were called on to talk. Lieutenant Buck Lualien, of Pendleton, state traffic officer, urged co-operation between the police departments and the prosecuting attorneys, and that they familiarize themselves with each other's work and problems. Carl Helm, district attorney of La Grande, discussed the relationship of the district attorney to police officers.

Walter Lansing, director of safety in the state traffic department, of Salem, discussed the department's method of safety education and accident prevention by charts, lectures, motion pictures and stereoscopic slides. After a citizen once becomes familiar with the laws and the methods of complying with them there is a greater degree of compliance and lesser degree of accident. Mr. Lansing believed that a series of charts he explained the law of right-of-way, and against "jay-walking."

Mr. Haynes related a short history of the organization since its beginning three years ago. Mr. Haynes was president for three years and it was due to his efforts that the organization has grown thus far. Mr. McKinnis stated, Mr. Haynes feels that the main work of the association is to produce a maximum of efficiency through co-operation, which can be obtained only by organization and friendly relations.

A. Johnson, La Grande, spoke for the prohibition enforcement division; C. O. Franklin, Baker, game division; W. L. Gary, of Portland, represented the railroad; and City Manager A. B. Cherry welcomed them to the city.

The banquet was informal, held in the main dining room of the La Grande hotel. President McKinney acted as toastmaster, and called on the following speakers: Chief Haynes, address of welcome; Robert Christman, Enterprise; Jesse Breckner, Carl Helm, Walter Lansing and Judge L.
