SAN DIEGO, Cal., May 13 (AP)—While funeral service was being held for Hazel Bradshaw, 33, slatin telephone operator, her sweetheart, Moss E. Garrison, 37, was arraigned here Tuesday on charges of murdering her. Preliminary hearing was set for May 27.

### Lights Spot Dull Portion of Mind

LOS ANGELES (AP)—With two 100-watt electric lights, the dominance of one side of the human brain over the other is studied by a new method at the University of Southern California.  
When a person looks at these lamps, set in a special box the light from one registers more on the left side of the brain than does the light from the other.  
This is a matter of the position of the lamps, combined with the fact that each eye divides the light, one-half of the retina registering light perception on the right cortex of the brain while the other half registers on the left cortex.  
The two sides of the brain are likely to be unequal in their power of perceiving light, says Dr. Milton Metfessel, chairman of the department of psychology, conducting the research. The person looking into the box adjusts the lights until he thinks the intensity of each is equal. If one side of his brain is visually dominant, the adjustment is not equal.

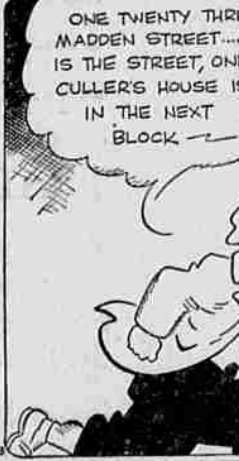
