Governor Meier Appoints Judge SALEM, May 13 (AP)—Governor Julius L. Meier today appointed Donald T. Templeton of Hillsboro as county judge of Washington county to succeed Judge Frank Livermore, who died last week. Templeton, aged 27, is believed to be the youngest county judge in the state and perhaps on the Pacific coast. Templeton graduated from the University of Oregon law school in 1929 and has since been practicing law in Hillsboro. Templeton was here today to receive his appointment.

Six Arrested Due To Egg Throwing SALEM, May 13 (AP)—Four men and two boys were arrested here today—the culmination of the capital city egg-throwing investigation. One of the men is married. All will be given hearings. Officers have been on the watch for guilty ones believed irresponsible boys, following the barrage of "rotten" eggs hurled at a young woman here. Her case was one of several reported to police during the past few weeks. Officers expressed surprise that the gang included mature men. All admitted their guilt.

Would Repeat Or Amend Farm Act BOSTON, May 13 (AP)—Representatives of Boston wool, fruit and produce and grain and flour associations today declared that the federal agricultural marketing act should be repealed or amended to eliminate provisions "permitting the lending of public money for private enterprise." William S. Feibiger, president of the Boston wool trade association, said "You are aware of the failure of our government to stabilize the price of wheat, of cotton, or any other farm commodity. The agricultural marketing act has been in operation for more than 18 months' time. It has been a dismal failure and it should be repealed or amended."

WICKERSHAM GROUP MEETS WASHINGTON, May 13 (AP)—The Wickersham commission met today in its first session since April 22. The meeting was expected to last two days or more and another has been set for May 27. The life of the commission expires June 30 and its members are attempting to complete their work. Two of their eleven reports have been completed—those on prohibition and criminal statistics. The finishing touches were expected to be added today to one on prosecution.
