Nowland's Feat At Corvallis Is Topic For Talk

OREGON STATE COLLEGE, Corvallis, May 15—Officials and sports followers who are gathered here, anticipating over the events of the fifth annual Oregon state interscholastic track and field meet are loud in their praise of Fred Nowland, ace hurdler of the La Grande Tigers, who broke the tape ahead of the field in the 120-yard high hurdles for the second successive year. Nowland crossed the high sticks in 15.3 seconds there, eclipsing the mark of 16 seconds flat set by Walter Muirhead of Columbia in 1914.

This was Nowland's fourth year as a competitor in the state meet. The steady advance to the top by this tall Eastern Oregon lad is shown by his record in the successive meets. In his first year, 1928, he failed to place, but in 1929 he began to show his ability when he tied for fourth in the high hurdles. In 1930 he won the title only because of a technicality. After the meet was completed, the Tigers were leading Grant High of Portland by one-half point, but it was discovered that Torrence had competed in and placed in four events which is one more than the rules of the meet allow. Senators Take 4 Out of 5 In Western Games

By Hugh S. Fullerton Jr. (Associated Press Sports Writer) The Washington Senators had to go west to hit their stride in the American league pennant campaign. Playing against their strong eastern rivals, the Senators could get no better than an even break and were in fifth place when they set out for their inter-sectional battles.

In the west, Washington has won four games out of five—only a fair performance compared to the clean sweep scored so far by the Philadelphia Athletics and New York Yankees—said Jimmie Foxx, third baseman. But Washington has been pitted against the two strongest western clubs, Cleveland and Detroit, while the Yankees and A's have been knocking over St. Louis and Chicago.

The fourth victory yesterday, a 5-4 triumph over Cleveland, did not alter the standing, but it did give Washington the league leading pitcher, Sad Samuel Jones won his third straight game, allowing only eight hits.

Burnett's homer in the second inning brought the only Cleveland score until Jones eased up a bit at the fifth, Kloder, of Pendleton, hit the homer. Nowland, however, was not satisfied with merely coming in first in his event so he came back to Corvallis Saturday and clinched his brilliant prep school record by breaking the all-time state record. Although Nowland did not win points in the low hurdles at the state meet, he is credited with breaking the all-time record in this event at the Eastern Oregon meet at La Grande this year. He went the distance in 25.6 seconds. He also crossed the high hurdles in 15.5 seconds at La Grande which is 4 of a second better than his own mark set at Corvallis Saturday.

In Washington By Herbert Plummer WASHINGTON—If the Hon. Patrick Hurley, secretary of the War Relocation Authority, and his wife, who has ever felt baffled when confronted with a situation, has a little bit of the fact concealed around these parts.
