transportation charges, returns to the growers. The contract also would limit 1932 and 1933 acreages to a percentage determined by the association's directors.

Stone said the present situation would lead farmers to store wheat on their farms, feed it liberally and cut acreage, thus reducing the heavy supplies. He said the board counted upon federal, state and farmers' organizations to emphasize these facts, and "we are confident that in such ways as these the difficulties of the situation will be met and surmounted."

"The history of even regional sign-up campaigns among farmers," he said, "is extremely discouraging, and so is the evidence of results to farmers from such campaigns."

Because of varying conditions, and the reluctance of growers to "sign contracts affecting their future actions, particularly where actions two years or more in advance are in-

involved . . ." Stone said, "it is not practical or economically desirable to secure adherence to a uniform plan of acreage reduction."

expected, with the goal to be between \$700,000 and \$800,000. President Kerr insisted that the college keep its courses in commerce and should be given courses in the pure sciences.

During the discussion it was brought out that the university out-state fees were \$12 a term higher than at the state college, and it was explained the college treasury could be \$14,000 richer by charging the same as the university. Both presidents agreed on the desirability of uniform fees.

Buy Grain Bags From San Quentin

PORTLAND, May 15 (AP)—Reported purchase by the National Grain corporation of one million grain bags from San Quentin prison, was being discussed by the grain trade here today. It was understood an option on an additional one million bags had been taken by the corporation. The price was said to be 6 1/2 cents.

The bags will arrive from California in time for the new crop, it was said, and will be distributed to farmers through the Farmers' National Grain corporation.

It was pointed out that the farm bureau agency made the deal, enabling farmers in the Northwest to purchase bags at a considerable saving.

30 REBELS KILLED RANGOON, Burma, May 15 (AP)—Thirty rebels were killed today in an attack of a combined force of Punjabi and military police on the insurgent camp near Taunggyi in the Insein district. Guns, ammunition, rice and other stores were captured. Two Punjabis were wounded.
