SPEED AND DISEASE

A room in one of the largest hospitals of a middle-western American city has been placed under quarantine because it contains a patient suffering with a rare but oriental disease; and while the news may not seem especially remarkable, it does point to a new problem with which the recent

improvement in human communication has presented the world.

The victim, in this case, is a returned traveler who fell ill, in America, with distomiasis, a disease contracted in the interior of Korea, and heretofore practically unheard of in this country. Specialists in oriental diseases, at the Johns Hopkins and Tulane Universities, would like to examine the sufferer; distomiasis is highly communicable, and he cannot be moved for fear of spreading the infection.

Usually we take it for granted that faster transportation between nations is an unalloyed boon. Men can travel from America to China now in a fortnight (or possibly less), whereas the trip used to take three months or more. A triumph over space? A magnificent saving in time? Undoubtedly; but also a new problem that will keep wise men furrowing their brows for another century.

For if men can make the journey quickly and easily, so can disease germs. Pestilences heretofore confined to Siberian villages and Amazon jungles can now appear in New York and Chicago. Germs that have remained in the world's backwaters can now emigrate and find new frontiers in America and Europe. Distomiasis, for example, can become a world problem, and not one for Korea alone.

All of this is just one more reminder that no man, in this modern era, can live to himself. We have the whole world for our next-door neighbors now, and not just the inhabitants of our own country. Isolation between two broad oceans has lost much of its significance.

Thus the health department of a city in the American interior must worry over a malady previously confined to a small peninsula on the coast of Asia. Over-production in the rubber factories of Akron can mean starvation to native workers in the Malay peninsula. The opening of cotton textile factories by the Nationalists of India can ruin an industry in Great Britain. The meat exports of the Argentine can spell hard times to cattle raisers in Wyoming. Farmers in the American wheat belt are suffering because Europe's peasants are raising bigger crops than they did a decade ago.

So it goes. Flung a stone at a native chief in mid-Africa and you are apt to knock the plug hat from the head of an industrialist in Detroit. There are no "purely local" problems any more. Every event has its international consequences.

the fact that La Grande is dependent upon the co-operation and assistance of the forestry service in building the Starkey-Ukiah road in the near future. This will be a big project and when completed will give a direct road from La Grande to the John Day highway, and open to La Grande a large area. It will furnish the timber workers direct access to La Grande, otherwise the trade of this group would be lost to this section, due to inaccessibility. The Mt. Emily Lumber Co., who will operate in that territory, pays out in wages on an average of \$1000 per day when operating.

Before anything can be done towards actual construction on this road it will be necessary to have the assistance of the forestry department in getting the road placed on the highway project.

Anyone wanting to make a contribution towards the fund of \$2000 required this year to insure the building of the Mt. Emily scenic highway may send or leave this amount at the office of the chamber of commerce, the United States National bank or the La Grande National bank. Acknowledgement of all contributions will be made in the Observer and by the chamber of commerce.

New Record For Liquor Arrests Set Last Month

WASHINGTON, May 15 (AP) — More arrests for liquor law violations than in any month this year, and an appreciable decrease in court congestion were shown in the prohibition bureau's monthly report for April.

The summary reflected a tendency toward shorter jail sentences and higher fines, a condition attributed to efforts to dispose of as many cases as possible.

In April there were 5,563 arrests against 5,273 in March, 4,181 in February and 4,500 in January. The April activity brought the total for the ten months of the present fiscal year to 50,801 and was 483 above the monthly average for that period.

At the same time there were 21,074 liquor cases pending in courts at the end of April, 474 less than at the last of March and 1,671 fewer than at the beginning of the fiscal year.

Two-thirds of the twelve enforcement districts reported increased arrests. The exceptions were districts two, New York state; five, comprising Alabama, Florida, Georgia, Louisiana, Mississippi, and Texas; ten, comprising Arizona, Colorado, New Mexico, Utah and Wyoming; and 11, comprising California, Nevada and Hawaii.

The average jail sentence in April was 200 days as against the fiscal year average of 231. Fines jumped from \$148.68 as the year's average to \$184.74 in April. The total of \$592,488 for last month brought aggregate fines in the fiscal year to \$4,272,473.
