Commencement At O. S. C. Will Be Held June 1

OREGON STATE COLLEGE, Corvallis, May 15—With the 32nd annual commencement day on June 1, less than three weeks away, plans are practically complete here for the graduation exercises and the alumni reunions which always accompany the close of the college year.

Approximately 511 seniors and graduate students will receive degrees at the hands of President W. J. Kerr, who will be presiding at his 24th commencement at Oregon State. At his first commencement here in 1908 there were 83 degrees conferred. Dr. W. O. Thompson, president emeritus of Ohio State University, has been selected as the commencement speaker for Monday's exercises, while Dr. Herbert S. Johnson of Boston is to give the Baccalaureate address Sunday morning.

Saturday, May 30, has been designated alumni day when 10 classes will hold reunions. As this is Memorial day, appropriate ceremonies just before noon will be held in connection with the college H. O. T. C. The Silver Jubilee reunion will be held by the class of 1905 which finished just 25 years ago. A. G. B. Bouquet of Corvallis, managing the gathering of the 45 members of that class. Guests of honor at this reunion will be the two surviving members of the four who were graduated in the class of 1891. These are Mrs. Ida B. Callahan of Corvallis and Thomas L. Charman of Oregon City, who will be celebrating the Golden Jubilee. The two oldest living graduates, Mrs. Mary Whitely Corvallis, 1871, and James K. Weatherford, Albany, 1872, will be honored. Find Skiis And Sled of German Arctic Explorer

BERLIN, May 15 (AP)—Word received today from the Wegener relief expedition in Greenland said the explorer's sled and skiis had been found but that no trace of the explorer had been discovered.

Prof. Alfred Wegener, who headed a German expedition into Greenland with one sled and one native. He was given up for lost when a relief expedition reached the central base only to learn of his departure. When he left the base he took provisions for only three weeks and if he were alive he should have reached the west coast long ago. There is a possibility that he may have dug himself in somewhere on the ice cap as did the British explorer, Augustine Courtauld, who was rescued last week, but leaders of the relief expedition said that possibility was scant.

Hall Asks Pure Sciences Remain At University

PORTLAND, Ore., May 15 (AP)—Pleading for the retention of pure sciences at the University of Oregon, Dr. Arnold Bennett Hall, president of the institution, addressed the state board of higher education here for more than two hours yesterday. He urged that they be not moved to Oregon State college as suggested.

Figures presented showed that a reduction of \$184,000 could be made in operation of the university during the last 18 months of the current biennium. Reductions outlined would have serious effects on the medical school in Portland, he said. More cutting there would be disastrous. Under pre-arranged plans, he said, one floor of the out-patient ward at the medical school was to be eliminated. The drastic cut demanded in the interest of economy would probably make necessary elimination of another floor.

Dr. Hall charged that the present allocation of funds was unfair and undesirable in any sense. Presidents of the five state higher educational institutions would not like the new allocations to be made, but they would have to take them. In demanding that various classes be maintained at the university, he said he did not want to exact any pound of flesh from the state college. The order of several classes was recommended in the federal survey. Hall pleaded haste as the cause of any inaccuracies that had crept into the brief he filed in answer to the survey report. President William J. Kerr of O. S. C. took exception to several statements in the brief.

Museum Acquires A Silver Shekel

WASHINGTON, May 15 (AP)—A silver shekel, the kind of coin said to have been paid to Judas for betraying Christ, had its picture taken at the National Geographic society yesterday. Latest acquired rarity of the National Geographic museum, the smooth-edged shekel, slightly smaller than a quarter, with a sacred vessel on one side and a flower device on the other, created quite a stir among scientists.

So rare is the shekel that the Smithsonian institution, with its large collection of coins, has but a half dozen. P. T. Belote, curator in charge of the Smithsonian coins, said a fine example of a shekel was to be highly prized. Just brought to this country, the silver piece of New Testament times was the gift of F. V. Fisher, on behalf of the American colony at Jerusalem. The coin was found with others in a clay urn by a workman excavating for the foundation of a new building in Palestine. The theory was ad-

Ariel Dam Sealed; Lake to Be Formed

VANCOUVER, Wash., May 15 (AP)—The Ariel dam on the Lewis river near Woodland, was sealed Wednesday, completing construction on the \$5,500,000 first unit of the North-western Electric company's hydro-electric project. It is expected it will take all summer for the lake to fill. When formed it will be 12 miles long and more than one mile wide. The dam is about 200 feet high. The power plant will generate 60,000 horsepower. Three more units will be added later. Construction on the Ariel dam started about 18 months ago.

Wife Surrenders After Shooting

SAN FRANCISCO, May 15 (AP)—Richard Pontet, 30, former deputy sheriff and jailer, was shot and probably fatally wounded early today by his wife, Margaret, 25, who surrendered.

Mrs. Pontet said her husband came home intoxicated and threatened to kill their six-year-old daughter, Alice. The wife said she fired as Pontet advanced toward the little girl.

that petition, and hearing was set for May 19. Completed petitions for the referendum, bearing the names of 10,680 voters in the state, must be filed with the secretary of state by June 8. Should these petitions be completed, the state police system would not go into effect until after the November 1932 elections. The present bill makes the law effective August 1 of this year. The injunction suit will not be fought by Gifford, he announced, unless the attorney-general delays in issuing the new ballot title. In the latter event, Gifford and Robinson will fight the injunction proceedings.

Gifford, at the time of filing the new petition, issued an open letter to Governor Julius L. Meier, in which he defended the action to refer the police bill to the people. The letter contained a scathing denunciation of the attacks upon the referendum.

Wilkins' Submarine To Carry Balloon

AKRON, Ohio, May 15 (AP)—A balloon will play a part in the contemplated meeting of Sir Hubert Wilkins' submarine and Dr. Hugo Eckener's zeppelin at the north pole this summer.

The balloon has been specially prepared here for the Wilkins-Eckener expedition and will be used to communicate to the zeppelin the location of the submarine.

Need of such a communication balloon was pointed out by Dr. Eckener when he made arrangements with Sir Hubert for the pole meeting. The balloon will be attached to or near the submarine and allowed to ascend 3,000 to 4,000 feet so as to surmount the clouds should there be a low ceiling on the day of the proposed meeting.

The balloon built for this purpose is about 12 feet in diameter and will have a lift of 35 pounds of inflated hydrogen or slightly less than that if inflated with helium. This will be sufficient to carry aloft the fine wire with which it will be held captive.
