live" is the chief word in Turkey's new economic vocabulary. Following his personal investigation of Anatolia's political and economic situation, President Kemal proposes the creation of cooperative societies for each of Turkey's chief products.

Fig raisers in Smyrna already are banded in a cooperative, and the Gazel would extend this system to tobacco, silk, cotton, mohair, dairy products and other items on Turkey's export list.

Two great gains are expected for Turkey: first, peasant and manufacturer will gain through selling his products directly to the cooperative instead of through middle-men; and secondly, Turkish exports, whose renown suffers at present from lack of uniformity in quality, will be standardized through the control of the cooperatives.
