Services Sunday To Include Many Special Features

Navy Day to be Observed — Baccalaureate Services at Tabernacle — Honor War Dead.

Memorial Sunday will be observed throughout America Sunday to honor the soldiers who died in the World War. La Grande churches set plans for special religious ceremonies in observance of the event.

Navy day, in honor of the sailors who died in the Spanish American war, will be observed by morning services at the Episcopal church and by an afternoon religious ceremony conducted by the Women's Relief Corps at Riverside park.

Another interesting feature of Sunday's services will be the baccalaureate services for the graduating class of the La Grande High school at the L. D. S. tabernacle in the evening with Rev. M. G. Tennison, of St. Peter's church, delivering the address on the theme, "Life Challenges You."

St. Peter's Episcopal Church at O. Avenue

Military organizations of the city have been invited to conduct the Memorial day services at St. Peter's church Sunday, and at 11 o'clock morning services will be conducted by the church. Rev. M. G. Tennison, pastor, states, "The O. A. S., Women's Relief Corps, Spanish war veterans, and the veterans of the World War will be represented, and the public is invited to attend."

The choir will render the anthem, "Behold I Come a New Heaven," by Harris, with solo by Mrs. Florence Lynch Miller and George Burns. Mrs. H. N. Ashby will preside at the organ, and Miss Mae Roberts will assist the choir with a violin accompaniment. Mrs. Ashby will play the prelude, "Christ Triumphant," by Gould and the postlude, "American National Anthem," by Gould.

"Festal Taps," is the subject of the service's sermon.

Sunday is also Whit Sunday, an outstanding season in the church year. In this season is commemorated

the coming of the Holy Spirit at the Pentecost of the Lord. On this day Episcopalian assemble together in the sacrament of Holy Communion to renew the presence of the Holy Spirit in their lives. It is especially a day of worship for youth. Mr. Tennison states, "Whit Sunday communion will be held at St. Peter's church at 8:30 a. m., and will be the only communion service of the day at the Episcopal church."

Methodist Episcopal Church Fourth and Spring

This is the spirit of Memorial Sunday which is being observed throughout La Grande Sunday. W. H. Hartung, pastor of the First Methodist church, will deliver an inspirational address on "Memorial Day," at the 11 o'clock services.

A quartet will sing "The Boys of the Old Brigade," and Paul Knaus will furnish a selected solo for the services, which are among the most important of the spring.

The church Sunday school will meet in regular session at 9:45, and because of the high school baccalaureate services there will be no Epworth League or evening worship.

Presbyterian Church Washington and Sixth

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Ample Gun Supply And 2100 Men Is Boast of Sandino

MEXICO CITY (AP) — Dr. Pedro Jose Delgado, representative here of General Augusto Cesar Sandino, says that his chief is starting his fifth year of revolutionary warfare in Nicaragua with 2,100 well equipped and disciplined men.

His movement started at Occidental May 4, 1927, when Sandino refused to accept the Somoza settlement, being by laying down his arms. A bitter battle resulted and he fled to the north with some followers.

Many of his 2,100 men and some 200 civilians were killed in that battle," said Delgado, "but it only made him resolved to carry on his fight. Since then he has lost 3,000 men in fights with American marines and Nicaraguan guards.

Delgado asserted that Sandino today has 4,000 rifles, 36 machine guns, adequate ammunition and a plentiful supply of food.

"There is no mystery about where Sandino gets his arms and supplies," said Delgado. "Early in the fight about 400 rifles were sent in from outside, but that is all the outside help he has received."

"In the earlier days the marines used to send supply trains overland. We captured several of these and got 2,000 rifles and some machine guns. We captured 34 other machine guns from guards and marines and got several more from supplies which our men shot down. We are still capturing ammunition."

"Sandino doesn't pay his men, but gives them supplies and tobacco. For food, they live off the country."

Session Clamor Menaces Unity of Australian States

CANBERRA (AP) — Fervent session movements in Australia threaten to smash the Australian Federation of States into a series of small nations.

For more than a year the state of Western Australia — rich in minerals and agricultural wealth, and great in extent but small in population — has been threatening to break away from the commonwealth.

Now the session fever has extended to the small, but potentially wealthy, island state of Tasmania.

The secretaries of both Western Australia and Tasmania contend that the central government legislates for the richer and more populous states, disregarding the others and hindering their development.

Dissatisfaction with the existing form of government is also found in the great state of New South Wales. Known as the master state, New South Wales is the richest and most populous of the states, and is threatening to break away from the commonwealth.

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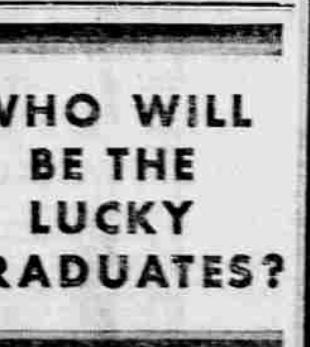
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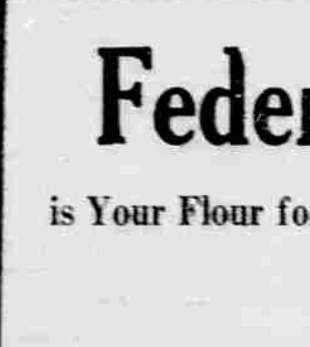
