Pope Characterizes Economic World

"Investment of superfluous income in providing opportunities for employment, assuming that the labor employed produces results which are really useful, is to be considered an act of real liberality particularly appropriate to the needs of our time." The remedy for the present economic evils, the pontiff wrote, is a return to the principles of "right reason and Christian social philosophy," regarding mutual cooperation of capital and labor.

"Relations between capital and labor," he wrote, "must be determined according to the laws of strictest justice supported by Christian charity." The encyclical demands that free competition and economic domination be kept within just and definite limits and be brought under the effective control of public authority. Those who work, the pontiff said, "should have an ample sufficiency in the form of wages" which will enable the worker's family to live decently and to accumulate a "certain moderate ownership." Wage contracts, said the Pope, are not essentially unjust but, under present conditions, he advocated some form of partnership such as already has been tried. Wages, he said, must be based on the kind of labor, the general prosperity of the world and the condition of business. He adds a "word of praise" for wage systems which increase the worker's pay as his family burdens increase.

Loans Are Approved

WASHINGTON, May 23 (AP)—Agricultural credit corporation loans totaling \$72,371 have been approved by the national advisory loan committee to provide additional credit facilities in the drought regions.

A fund of \$10,000,000 was appropriated by congress for this purpose. The loans, which went to 420 stockholders in 28 credit companies in 17 states, included in Tri-County Credit corporation, Rapelle, Montana \$15,000; Empire Agricultural Credit corporation, The Dalles, Oregon \$52,000. Wash Advocates The World Court

CHATTANOOGA, Tenn., May 23 (AP)—Senator Thomas J. Walsh, Montana Democrat, predicts that when another great world war comes the United States will be drawn into it. Speaking at the University of Chattanooga Thursday night, Walsh said such a war would endanger America's huge foreign trade, merchant marine, foreign loans, and investments, in addition to plunging the entire world into almost incredible misery.

Walsh said that the world court lessens the chance of another world conflict, and urged that America join the court. He said congress undoubtedly would take up adherence to the court at the December session. "We can afford some chance on adverse decision by an international court," the senator said in answer to opposition to the judicial organization on the grounds that it might decide an issue contrary to American desires.

Eugene Palmer, 81, Dies of Pneumonia

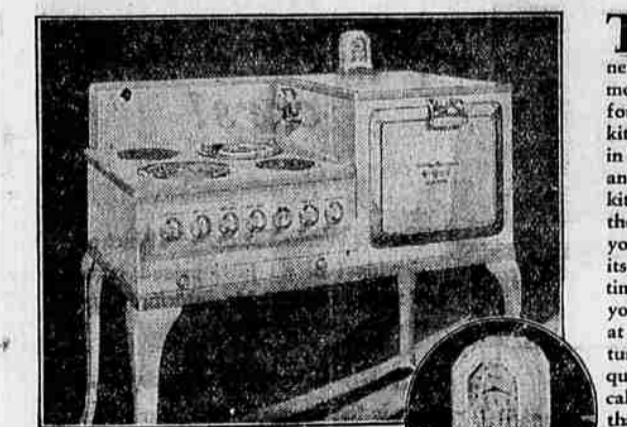
PORTLAND, May 23 (AP)—Eugene Palmer, 81, for many years active in Democratic party circles, and a member of the grange, died at his home here Thursday after a short illness with pneumonia.

He was born in Ohio in 1849. His many years of activity in the grange began in Kansas in 1873. He continued his membership in Oregon and was elected delegate to several grange conventions. In 1888 he moved to Polk county, Oregon, and later to Benson and Linn counties where he engaged in farming. Funeral services were to be held here today.
