

Butter Market Fairly Steady As Week Closes

PORTLAND, May 23 (AP) — Trading in the butter market appeared fairly steady for the weekend sessions. There was no general change in prices either on the exchange or on the open market. Butterfat is generally 21c here with most country points paying 19-21c lb.

Market for eggs reflects more than passing eagerness in the country generally. While conditions locally show practically no change for the week-end, or even for recent days, the feeling is weaker at most other points.

Speculative demand for storage is less urgent with the hot weather noted at various points. Receipts in the country generally are at the flush production periods although the big day has already been passed locally.

Easy prices are generally reflected for strawberries at the weekend with best improved Oregon around \$2.25 top generally although a few were reported a fraction better.

LIVESTOCK IS DOWN TO PRICE LEVEL OF 1914

CHICAGO, May 23 (AP) — Declines of half a dollar on all grades of livestock this week brought prices on hogs and cattle down to those at the outbreak of the world war in 1914.

Large runs of cattle poured in each day this week and because wholesalers were unable to sell their beef already on hand, the buying of cattle came to a standstill Wednesday.

Prices declined 50 cents, but even then buyers were absent.

This decline brought the average cost of cattle bought in Chicago this week to \$7.30. The last time this price was paid was in May, 1911.

The top price paid for hogs yesterday was only 3 cents above the price paid for hogs in May, 1915. The average price paid yesterday for hogs was 49 cents under that paid one week before.

NEW YORK, May 23 (AP) — Stocks turned moderately heavy today after an irregular advance in the early part of the two-hour session. Ralls, however, were firm, with the exception of Union Pacific which lost a couple of points.

Changes for the most part were narrow and the turnover was small. U. S. Steel, American Can, American Telephone, Westinghouse and Case dropped a point or more. Crucible Steel tumbled 3 and Macy yielded more than 2 to a new low. Bethlehem was steady. Eastman Kodak again met pressure, sagging to another new minimum.

Sales were in the neighborhood of 500,000 shares.

CORVALLIS, May 23 (AP) — Breaking our meet record and tying three more, the Oregon State Frosh yesterday defeated the Oregon Fresh track team 78 1-6 to 43 5-6.

Twitcheil, of the Rooks, broke the half mile meet record when he stepped the distance in 2:02, bettering the 1925 record of Overstreet of Oregon by eight-tenths of a second.

Three meet records were tied in the hundred and 440 dashes and the pole vault.

Oregon State won the mile run, 220 yard dash, shot put, discus, pole vault, broad jump, 880 run, javelin and mile relay.

Oregon took the 440, the 120 high hurdles, the high jump and the 220 low hurdles.

The State college took the mile run, 100-yard dash, pole vault, javelin, 220-yard dash and two-mile run.

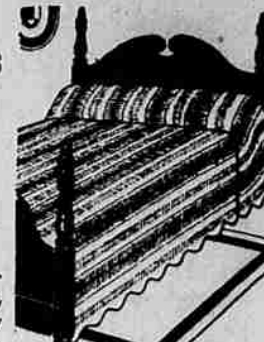
