two, William Reman and Thomas Langan, were boarders. For the past several days Mrs. Summers has been questioned by officials of the state's attorney's office, the coroner and the police. The authorities said Mrs. Summers also was beneficiary in 18 policies on ten persons. She has affirmed her innocence, asserting to police the policies were made out to her in gratitude for kindness. It was the more recent death of her nephew that precipitated a renewed inquest into the death of the other persons. Relatives of her husband demanded that his body be exhumed for examination.

Combustibles Law Has No Penalty, Van Winkle Says

SALEM, May 26 (AP)—No penalty has been provided by law for failure to comply with rules and regulations of the state fire marshal relating to storage and use of combustibles, Attorney General L. H. Van Winkle held in an opinion returned today. The statute provides the marshal with power to make rules, and power to enforce them, but fails to provide a penalty, he stated. The information was requested by A. H. Averill, state fire marshal.

Applications for permits to appropriate water for power purposes pending before the state engineer, which applications have not been transferred to the new hydro-electric commission through exercise of the option before April 28, 1931, are void, Van Winkle stated in another opinion. Such applications are likewise without virtue in establishing priority claim thereafter before the hydro-electric commission.

The state tax commission has no authority to give power of attorney to an adjustment bureau to represent the state in the collection of delinquent taxes, Van Winkle informed John H. Carking, of the state tax commission, in an opinion requested. The delinquent taxes of a firm under process of liquidation are not on a par with other accounts owing by such firm, Van Winkle held.

The authority of the secretary of state to test and approve lighting equipment on motor vehicles will not be transferred to the state police with the enactment of the police measure, Van Winkle informed Hal E. Hoss, secretary of state.

Few Changes In Western Trade

SAN FRANCISCO, May 26 (AP)—The weekly Bradstreet trade survey showed few important changes in the larger Pacific coast centers, today's report revealed.

Seattle trade, retail and wholesale, remained quiet, with limited improvement. The agricultural outlook "was fair." Wholesale grocery business held up well in Spokane, but quiet in lumber and mining was reflected in hardware trade and retail trade was spotted.

Around Portland the weather was favorable for crops.

ALLEGED KILLER SURRENDERS

NEW YORK, May 26 (AP)—Howard W. Bridgetta, 29, a clerk, sought by police for the killing of his cousin, Dr. Joseph T. Loughlin, Brooklyn surgeon, in an alleged pistol duel, walked into headquarters early today with his attorney and surrendered.

The attorney turned a revolver over to the lieutenant and said: "This is the gun, which was used in self defense."

the supervision of trained master teachers, and students who graduate from the standard two-year course of the Normal school are eligible to secure a one-year state certificate valid for teaching the elementary grades in the one-, two-, and three-year high schools of Oregon. For students who are unable to pursue two years of work without interruption, the Normal school offers an elementary course, extending through five regular quarters or 30 weeks, and after completing the course the student will be eligible to secure by examination a one-year state certificate valid for teaching in the elementary grades. Courses to be offered in art are: fundamentals, public school art, design, art in environment, art history and appreciation, stage costume and design, decorative lettering and poster work, composition, and figure construction. Education and psychology courses are: introduction to education, intermediate education, principles of primary education, education psychology, educational tests and measurements, school organization and management, observation and classroom practice, directed teaching, responsible teaching, history of education, administration of the elementary school, child psychology, junior high school, the Platonic school.

English Courses—English courses are: Literature survey, English grammar and composition, oral English, advanced composition, Shakespeare, poetry of the late 18th and early 19th centuries, story telling, play reading, play production, voice and diction, oral interpretation, child literature. Health and physical education courses are: health education, folk dancing, playground supervision, interpretative dancing, coaching theory and practice for women, campfire leadership, Loy Scout leadership, physical education and recreation. Library practice is offered in that field, and the mathematics courses are: intermediate and advanced algebra, plane trigonometry, and survey of mathematics. The music department offers music fundamentals, public school music, appreciation of music, elementary
