### BOTH NEW YORK TEAMS COP TILTS

#### Giants Win Double Header From Braves—Yankees Tame Champions.

Boston has been a tough customer for most of the National league's clubs this season, but the Giants have gone right along handling the Braves one setback after another.

The count now stands 7 to 3 for New York as the Giants, a bit behind in their race with the St. Louis Cardinals, scored two shutout victories yesterday to regain their odd position of being a half game ahead of the Cards by one method of counting but a few points behind in the percentage of wins.

They have held scoreless only three times all season and the Giants have done it each time.

**Boston Beaten Twice**

Manager John McGraw teamed up his pair of star southpaws for the afternoon, sending out Carl Hubbell to take a 3 to 0 victory in the first game and Bill Walker to win the second 6 to 0. Hubbell gave the Braves only two hits while Walker allowed eight to blank Boston for the second time this season.

St. Louis held its place at the top of the standing with some difficulty, winning a wide-open slugfest match from Pittsburgh 11 to 6. The Pirates broke loose in the eighth inning and threatened to take the game as they scored five runs to go ahead, but the Cards came back with six in the same frame. The defeat dropped Pittsburgh into sixth place as the Phillies beat Brooklyn 9 to 4 with an effective combination of the scarping pitching of Big Jim Elliott and the hard and timely hitting of Buzz Arlett and Patsy Whitney.

**Cubs Improve Position**

Chicago's Cubs had little trouble taking two games from Cincinnati, improving their position in fourth place until they were only a half game behind Boston. Bob Smith hurled the first game, winning 7 to 2 on an eight hit job and Ed Becht and Charley Root did the work in the second, granting seven hits for a 9-6 triumph.

The New York Yankees supplied something of a sensation for American league fans when they downed the Philadelphia Athletics 6 to 2, snatching the winning streak of the world's champions after 17 straight games. Lefty Gomez halted the A's with seven hits while the Yankees drove Ed Rommel out with a three run burst in the second. Babe Ruth topped off the job with his seventh homer of the year while Al Simmons clouted No. 9 just before the finish.

**Boston Trims Senators**

Boston also ended a streak, one of seven straight defeats, by beating out Washington 6 to 4. Jack Russell outlasted Sam Jones, who had gone four games without being charged with a defeat. The victory put the Red Sox in a tie for seventh place with the St. Louis Browns, who dropped a pair to Cleveland, while Washington, after a day in second place, dropped back to third.

Cleveland cut loose a hot attack to down St. Louis 12 to 0 and 4 to 2, and got some good pitching to support it. Walter Miller held the Browns to seven hits in the opener while Mel Harder allowed six in the second clash. As the Indians went into fifth place, Detroit's Tigers stayed just rated by beating the Chicago White Sox 4 to 2. George Uhle pitched effectively and won his own game when he finished a three run rally with a home run.

Mickey Tradd, Spokane and Johnny La Ross, Portland, fought a bloody ten round draw. Pat O'Day, Portland, nosed out a four-round decision over Johnny Garvey, Los Angeles.

### Fate of Burning Steamer and Crew Not Known Today

LONDON, May 27 (AP)—The fate of the Portuguese steamer Corretora Primeira, which caught fire in the Atlantic about 100 miles off the northern coast of Spain, was the subject of concern today in shipping circles.

Lloyd's Land's End radio station received a message from the British steamship Dunkwa saying that the Portuguese vessel was blazing from end to end and had sustained several explosions. The Dunkwa was alongside and had lowered boat in which to take off the crew.

Later, the German ship Ubena wireless that the Dunkwa reported she had taken the crew aboard, which the Ubena's master described as "impossible as the ship is all flames."

The fact that the related messages were conflicting and possibly garbled in transmission, cast great uncertainty over the extent of the disaster. The Corretora Primeira is of 872 gross tons and has a length of 181.5 feet. She was built in Oslo in 1927 and her port of registry is Ponta Delgada, Azores.

### Davis Cup Teams Meet in Capital

WASHINGTON, May 27 (AP)—A round of international amities greeted the youthful United States and Argentine Davis Cup teams today as a preface to their final battle for the right to seek the long-absent cup abroad.

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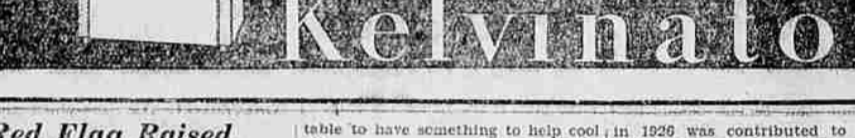
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- Can the freezing of ice cubes and desserts be speeded up when the need arises?

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### Red Flag Raised On War Memorial

SALEM, May 27 (AP)—A decrease in brokers' licenses and salesmen's licenses in real estate business in Oregon during the past year was shown in the report yesterday of C. V. Johnson, deputy real estate commissioner. During the fiscal year ending May 1, 1930, the total of brokers' licenses was 1665 while at the end of May 1, 1931, they dropped to 1472. Salesmen's licenses dropped from 295 to 278.

Eight formal hearings were held by the commissioner during the past year. Of the 110 complaints investigated, Johnson reported, 32 were found based on facts to substantiate such claims and \$3,983.02 was returned to injured parties. Two applications for licenses were denied, four licenses suspended, one license revoked and one conviction and five imposed during the past year.

### Sport Slants

Harvard and Yale men have heard it before, no doubt, but with another crew race between the Crimson and the Blue in the offing a favorite yarn of the late Nicholas Longworth is worth repeating:

"Of course I'm a Harvard man," began the speaker, "but since the 'surprise' game last fall perhaps I can afford to tell one on my alma mater, especially since it's a good one and a true one.

"When we were out on the Taft expedition to the Far East, our party split up at Tientsin. I went overland to Peking with a crowd while the rest went on by sea to Manila.

"With Willard Straight I went into what would be called the 'club car' on the train to the capital. It was cool and clean, and the coolest and cleanest thing in it was a Chinaman whom Straight knew. He presented me, and we all sat down at a light table to have something to help cool off.

"I beg your pardon, Mr. Longworth," said the Chinese, "but I cannot help knowing you to be a Harvard man and, therefore, I want to ask you a question. Why was it that the Harvard crew lengthened its slides by two inches at New London this summer?"

"I was struck all of a heap. 'Now let me get this straight,' said I. 'Here are you, in the depths of China, certainly not an American, asking me about the length of the slide used in a Harvard shell. Is that right? And if it is right, how do you get that way?'

"Why," he said, "I was educated in your country and three times I have been to New London. Three Harvard-Yale boat races have I seen, but, curiously enough, I have never seen a Harvard crew row in one."

"I hitched up closer to him and I said: 'Now, again, let me get this thing straight: You have seen three Harvard-Yale races at New London, but you've never seen a Harvard eight row in one. Is that right?'

"Well," I burst out, "where in the world did you watch those races from?'

"Oh," he grinned. "I was coxswain of the Yale crew!"

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
