Other members of the board who sustained her were B. P. Irvine, C. C. Colt, F. E. Calister and E. C. Sammons. This blocked immediate approval of the statement and resulted in a more minute examination.

Mrs. Pierce was appointed chairman of a committee to investigate living conditions at the two schools. Burch and Calister will serve with her on this committee.

The joint statement from the two presidents did not mention allocation of funds and functions, although this is regarded by the board as the most controversial subject to be considered. The feeling prevailed that Dr. Hall and Dr. Kerr were unable to reach an agreement over this problem. More time, it is believed, will be necessary for its discussion.

Both Calister and Burch expressed concern at the delays being encountered in arriving at a definite policy or understanding as to what should be done or will be done in connection with the recommendations of the national survey.

Mrs. Snedden's body, in yachting attire and a life belt, was found floating in the sound one mile off Collender's point, Darien, by William P. Allen, a Stanford fisherman. Mrs. David S. Snedden identified the body of her daughter-in-law.

Her life preserver raised serious doubts that there had been any survivors. Nothing found on Mrs. Snedden's body gave a clue as to what befell the yacht.

Miss Doris Search Sound.

New York police airplanes searched the sound as far as Block Island, R. I., and New London, Conn. Coast guard headquarters at New London dispatched boats.

First news that the ship was missing came from anxious friends, who notified the New York police department missing persons bureau. They said the yacht's motor was not working well when the cruise started and a 40-mile gale was blowing at the time. Whether a squall capsized the boat, when under sail, whether there was an explosion in the auxiliary engine was a matter of conjecture. It was the party's intention to return Sunday evening.
