Federal Agents Arrest Leaders Of Liquor Ring

KANSAS CITY, May 28 (AP)—Moving against what they described as a liquor ring operating in seven states under direction of Al Capone, federal agents yesterday had under arrest woman city official, a prominent political leader, twenty-one alleged conspirators, and had issued warrants for four "big time" bootleggers in federal prison at Leavenworth.

Miss Rosemary Lyons, city collector of delinquent taxes, was arrested on a warrant charging conspiracy to violate the prohibition law. She was described by Chief Keyes, assistant attorney, as the bookkeeper for the alleged liquor ring, and a friend of John Kahre, one of the twenty men arrested by the government last night.

John Lazia, known as a political power in the North End, and commonly rumored to be a personal representative of Capone, was arrested this afternoon.

Warrants were prepared, charging participation in the rings activities, for Ray Brown of Kansas City, termed by the government a "millionaire liquor dealer," and Max Cohen, Jim Cliff and Glick Herbert of Wichita, Kas., all serving sentences at Leavenworth.

Thomas Lamont Greets Foreign Trade Delegates

NEW YORK, May 28 (AP)—Thomas W. Lamont, of J. P. Morgan and company, welcoming delegates of the National Foreign Trade convention yesterday, urged that "we should attempt to discourage artificial barriers to foreign trade."

Mr. Lamont did not mention the tariff by name, but his statement brought applause from the convention and several delegates assumed that the tariff was one "artificial barrier" he had in mind.

"If we want foreign trade," the banker said, "we must make it as easy as possible. Some people think the other fellow should always buy."

His remarks preceded those of James A. Farrell, president of the United States Steel corporation, who urged that American business should work diligently to preserve and develop the foreign market.

His speech, as prepared for the press, said that "other causes," not the tariff, are the major factors "which have tended to disturb the balance between production and consumption throughout the world."

But Mr. Farrell in his remarks as delivered omitted all reference to the tariff. The tariff occupies formal place on the agenda of the council for the first time in its history.

Jon was sitting in the deep grass, his arms about his knees, his face turned sharply away. But she could see in the very line of his shoulders that he was strained and angry.

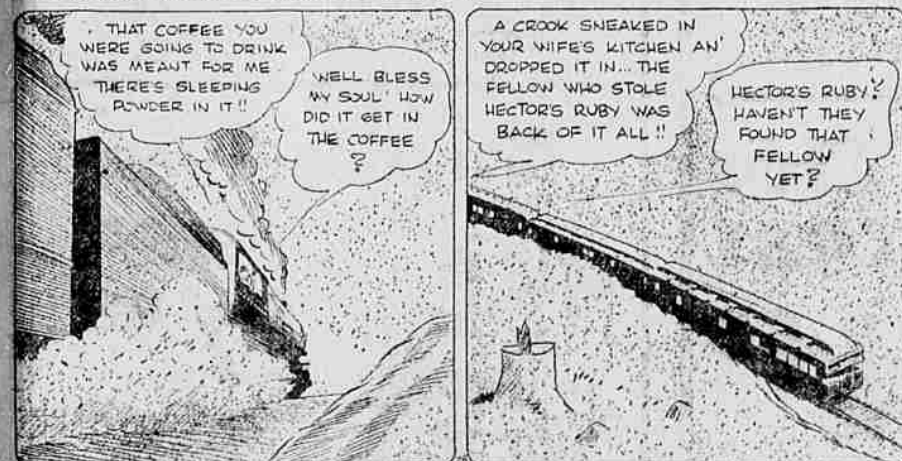
Something forced her to say, "You don't want me, do you?"

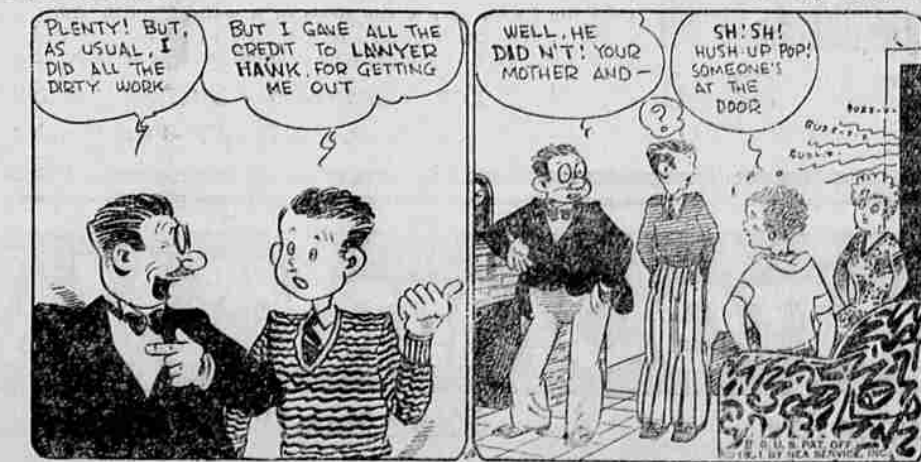
