WESTERN TEAMS INVADING EAST

Philadelphia-Washington-New York Combine Ready for the Visitors.

After a year's hiatus, in which only one game escaped the rain and the general movement of clubs east and west, inter-sectional warfare breaks out on both major league fronts today.

Four western members of the American league, invading the Atlantic seaboard for the first time this year, have scant prospects of success against the powerful Philadelphia, Washington-New York combine. The National league's eastern contingent, on the other hand, opens in the west with more concerted strength than it has boasted in seasons.

Interest centers on Sportman's park at St. Louis, where the New York Giants engage the St. Louis Cardinals in what is later on might be termed a "crucial series." It is a little too early for that just yet, but the series will lend a fair idea of the comparative strength of the two clubs.

The Brooklyn Robins, flushed with a four-game winning streak, engage the third place Chicago Cubs, who likewise captured four in a row. The Boston Braves open at Pittsburgh and the Phillies meet the Jackson Cincinnati Reds.

At the Chicago White Sox fall the thankless task of bearing the fast-traveling Philadelphia Athletics in their own park. The St. Louis Browns invade Yankee stadium, the Detroit Tigers face Washington, and the Cleveland Indians meet the Boston Red Sox to round out the American league main.

Their ability to take all extraordinary decisions again stood the Cardinals in good stead yesterday as they made Chicago Cubs, who tonight out the Cincinnati Reds, 6 to 5, in 12 innings. It marked the fifth time the Birds have been forced beyond the regulation nine innings this year and the fifth time they have won.

Inspired by Harvey Hendrick, who belted Cardinal pitcher for the three doubles stadium, the Detroit Tigers made a great fight of it, rallying in the ninth to score twice and tie the count. Not until the twelfth, when Wilson doubled and was singled in by Sparkey Adams, did the Cards succeed in subduing Dan Howley's lads. Both teams used three pitchers, but Adams finally getting credit for the victory.

Smith Sets Pace For Qualifiers In British Open

CARNOUSTIE, Scotland, June 2 (AP)—Faced by Macdonald Smith, returning to his homeland in search of his first major golf title, nine leading American professionals competing in the British open got championship today qualified for the tournament proper, beginning tomorrow.

Smith's record-breaking 71 as old Carnoustie, in the morning, added to his record-smashing 70 at Penmure, Barry, in the rain yesterday, gave him medalist honors with a 36 hole total of 141.

Seven strokes back of Mac came Horton Smith and Johnny Farrell, each with 148. Tony Manero scored 149, Gene Sarazen 151, Joe Turnesa 152, Joe Kirkwood 154 and Willie Hunter and Tommy Armour 155.

The two qualifying rounds were played at old Carnoustie and Penmure, 18 holes each. The tournament will be played on old Carnoustie, one of the oldest golf courses in Scotland, at 72 holes of medal play the first 36 tomorrow and Thursday among the 150 leading scoters and the final 36 on Thursday and Friday with only those within 15 strokes of the leader competing.

Yale Sends First Eastern Crew To Compete In West

SEATTLE (AP)—The first East-West crew race ever to be held on the Pacific coast will be rowed here June 16 by the 150-pound class of Yale and Seattle and the University of Washington on Lake Washington.

The race will be on the same day as the Foughkeppie Regatta in which the 150-pound class of Yale and Seattle boats will compete on the Hudson river.

Crews of Washington and California will compete in the East for a number of trophies. The Yale and Seattle Eastern boat journeyed to the Pacific coast.

Don Grant, 150-pound coach at Yale, and James Washington, coxswain, suggested the idea to Coach Alvin Ulbricksen of Washington and a formal invitation was issued which Yale accepted.

Ulbricksen hired his last year's captain, Warren Davis, and the former varsity bow oarsman started moulding Washington's first 150-pound crew. The race will be over a mile and six-tenths course.

The Husky lineup will likely be Ed O'Brien, stroke; George Doble, No. 7; Marshall Dutton, No. 6; George Spence, No. 5; Bill Chase, No. 4; Jack O'Brien, No. 3; and Alvin Ulbricksen, bow, and Cliff Armstrong, coxswain.

Three or four of the oarsmen have had racing training, but none has had experience. The Yale crew will use a Washington shell and oars.
