CHERRY PUDDING
Dinner Menu
Ham Loaf Escalloped Potatoes
Buttered Green Beans
Baked Apple Sauce
Bread Butter
Cabbage Salad
Cherry Pudding Lemon Sauce
Coffee
- Ham Loaf**
(Serving 6)
2 cups chopped cooked ham
1 cup soft bread crumbs
1 egg yolk
2 tablespoons finely chopped onions
2 tablespoons chopped parsley
1/4 teaspoon salt
1/4 teaspoon celery salt
1/4 cup milk
1 egg white, beaten
2 tablespoons butter, melted.
Mix ingredients. Pour into buttered loaf pan. Bake 30 minutes in moderate oven. Unmold carefully and place on platter. Garnish with parsley.
- Baked Apple Sauce**
4 cups sliced apples
2 thin slices lemon
2-3 cup sugar
1 cup water
1/4 teaspoon cinnamon
1/4 teaspoon nutmeg
Mix ingredients. Pour into glass baking dish. Cover and bake 20 minutes in moderate oven. Uncover and bake 10 minutes. Taste apples several times during the baking.
- Cabbage Salad**
3 cups shredded cabbage
1 teaspoon salt
1/4 teaspoon paprika
1/2 teaspoon celery seed
1/4 cup salad dressing.

Mix ingredients and serve.
Cherry Pudding
2 cups flour
3 teaspoons baking powder
1-3 teaspoon salt
1-3 cup sugar
4 tablespoons fat
1 egg
2-3 cup milk
Mix flour, baking powder, salt and sugar. Cut in fat and add egg and milk. Pour over cherry mixture which has been placed in bottom of stallow, buttered baking dish.
Cherry Mixture
2 cups cherries, seeded
2 tablespoons flour
2-3 cups sugar
2 tablespoons lemon juice
1/4 teaspoon nutmeg
1 cup water or cherry juice
4 tablespoons butter
Blend cherries, flour and sugar. Add rest of ingredients.

Seek Proprietress Of "Sun School"

PORTLAND, Ore., June 2 (AP) — A warrant charging her with "disturbing the public peace and health" was issued here yesterday against Leah M. Nelson, proprietress of a "sun school" for children, on the grounds that children in her care are weak from lack of food. The complaint was signed by Mrs. F. W. Swanton, manager of the Oregon Humane society. Miss Nelson was not found this morning, but officers said they expected to arrest her during the day. The complaint was issued after humane society officials testified four children at the "school" were weak from lack of food. They were taken to a hospital where they are receiving nourishment designed to counteract the allegedly severe cases of malnutrition. Bail for the woman has been set at \$100. Harry Chanackas, 19, was removed from the woman's home last Friday. Physicians said he was seriously undernourished. He weighed only 43 pounds.
