

Stabilization Of Price of Wheat Is Discontinued

WASHINGTON, June 2 (AP)—The responsibility for maintaining domestic wheat prices now rests on the American farmer after more than a year of government stabilization.

The farm board's authorization for the purchase of surplus stock to bolster prices ended with the fulfillment of May contracts and gave full play to the operation of the law of supply and demand.

The grain stabilization corporation first entered the market in February, 1930. Using money from the board's \$500,000,000 revolving fund and advances from private banks, it maintained a minimum price of 81 cents. The average price has ranged from 20 to 35 cents above world levels.

Speculation was renewed as to the final disposition of the huge stock of wheat, which will total upwards of 200,000,000 bushels. The only answer at the board was the reiterated statement that the surplus will be disposed of in a manner not to affect the domestic or world markets.

The board has authorized the sale of 25,000,000 bushels abroad. Approximately 25,000,000 have been sold. Chairman Boone said no decision had been made to sell more than this in event a good foreign demand continues. It was believed, however, the board would take advantage of every opportunity to dispose of portions of its holdings on which it must pay heavy storage charges.

Exact figures on the loss to the board through stabilization operations were not available. It will depend on the price received when the wheat finally is sold. Besides this, however, it has been estimated that the monthly carrying charges will total \$4,000,000.

The board contends that any losses will be far outweighed by the benefits to agriculture and business generally by the price stabilization when serious declines occurred in commodity prices at a time when many banks were in danger through loans on wheat.

Hold Man During Investigation Of His Wife's Death

KIAMATH FALLS, Ore., June 2 (AP)—N. T. Smith is being held in the county jail here while police investigate the death of his wife, Lena Smith, 22, who was shot to death yesterday during an argument with Smith over whether she would attend a dance.

Smith told officers his wife was killed when the two struggled for possession of a shotgun with which she was trying to shoot herself. The top of her head was torn away by the charge. An inquest will be held tomorrow. The shooting occurred at Fort Kiamath camp, 40 miles from here.

Smith told officers his wife wished to attend a dance at Fort Kiamath Saturday night. He did not wish to go. Mrs. Smith left her camp with a man named Parker and later joined her mother and sisters, and the party attended the dance.

Smith and the woman's four-year-old son by a former marriage were asleep in the tent. Smith said the time and Lena replied "ten minutes to three."

A quarrel followed. Smith said he told his wife "shut up—we'll talk it over in the morning."

The girl shouted "No, we will finish it now," Smith said. A shotgun rested on a support over the bed. Smith said Lena reached for the weapon. The two struggled for possession of it and the gun discharged. Mrs. Smith lived four hours after being wounded.

The Smiths had been camped near Fort Kiamath since March. They were married last February and Smith had been clearing wood from the land and selling it. Mrs. Smith's mother and three sisters live at Fort Kiamath.

Butter Demand Is Nearly Steady

PORTLAND, June 2 (AP)—Demand for butter appears practically steady in the local territory. More or less strength in California situation with an almost general request from San Francisco brokers to move supplies in that direction, took care of whatever surplus local stores and the fresh trade was unwilling to move.

Prices were generally unchanged for late session of the Portland produce exchange as well as on the open market. Prints, however, continue the previous mixed appearance. The demand appears principally for 90 to 91 score with a better call for 88 to 89 score than for 82 offering.

Butterfat values are generally unchanged with country prices still above the delivered parity of Portland and other coast centers.

There was no change in the price of eggs for the day. Receipts continue to decrease but are fully sufficient to take care of all needs of the trade. Outside markets are little changed.

STOCKS CLOSE HEAVY

NEW YORK, June 2 (AP)—Stocks closed heavy today, although net losses were much smaller than the declines of the previous session. The new Canadian tariff schedules, imposing higher duties on numerous important articles of American manufacture, and the public utilities speech by Governor Pinchot of Pennsylvania at French Lick found sentimentally disturbed after the experiences of Monday.

Reports that the weekly freight car loading figures would show a small gain brought in further covering toward the beginning of the last hour, but the market again turned downward and showed net decline of 1 to 4 points. Sales exceeded 3,000,000 shares.

WOOL SALE AT PILOT ROCK

PORTLAND, June 2 (AP)—Report in the wool trade indicates the holding of a sale at Pilot Rock the latter part of this week. Around 25,000 lbs. are indicated to be available for the sale. This is the first sale scheduled for some time.

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The decision was rendered in the case of the Saturday Press of Minneapolis, which had been suppressed under the statute by the lower courts as malicious, scandalous, defamatory and a public menace.

The constitutionality of the law was challenged by J. M. Near, one of its publishers. He contended the statute deprived him of the liberty guaranteed to the press by the federal constitution.

The case attracted widespread attention. Numerous influential newspapers commented editorially on the Minnesota law, regarding it as an encroachment upon the traditional freedom of the press.
