

INTEREST IN CARAVAN TRIP VERY STRONG

Wallawa County Enthusiastic as Time Nears For Trip to Spokane.

Union County's Support Sought

Four or Five Carloads From Here Assured, But Bigger Delegation is Desired.

Wallawa county is thoroughly interested in the caravan to go to Lewiston and Spokane on June 8 and 9 in behalf of the Blue Mountain highway, and efforts are being made locally to arouse more enthusiasm from La Grande, according to the planning, who returned today from Enterprise where he attended the Enterprise chamber of commerce meeting last night.

Thirty carloads of people from Enterprise and Wallawa county have been signed for the caravan, and approximately five from Union county have agreed to go, Mr. Henning said, it more are desired.

Purpose of Trip

The purpose of the caravan is to secure designation of the Blue Mountain road from Enterprise to Lewiston by the state highway department, Washington, so that money set aside for expenditure on the road may be put to work. Only a comparatively small stretch of road on the Washington side of the line remains incomplete, and when finished, would give a good road for automobile travel from Enterprise to Lewiston. It would cut down the distance to the Lewiston field by 15 miles, and the highway department at Spokane via Enterprise many, besides opening a new territory which is rich in scenery and potential wealth.

Spokane and Astoria are co-operating thoroughly with the caravan, and preparations are being made to give the Oregonians a great welcome when they arrive. Representative plans call for the assembly of the caravan on Washington side of the line at 5 p. m. June 8 at 10 a. m. June 9. An hour later a banquet will be held at the Lewiston hotel. The chamber of commerce at host, or 6 o'clock the morning of June 9. Parade in Spokane.

The caravan will leave Lewiston at 10 a. m. for the coast at Alene and Spokane by 10:30 in order to arrive at 11 o'clock. At noon the visitors will be guests of the Spokane chamber of commerce. The caravan will be accompanied by a band of music, and the group of delegates from La Grande, the Blue Mountain highway, and the American Legion will be in the parade. The caravan will arrive at a large crowd will be in attendance.

Company E Will Leave For Camp Monday, June 8

Troop Train Will Pick Up Two Officers and 61 Men From La Grande For Camp Clatsop.

Members of the local national guard unit, Company E, 188 Infantry, will entrain the evening of June 8 for a two-week period of field training at Camp Clatsop, located on Columbia Beach midway between Seaside and Astoria.

The encampment is held annually for the national guard regiments of Oregon, and about 3,000 or more men are gathered at the camp for the period. Reports are that several improvements have been made this year and that camp life will be even more attractive than usual. Also, it is expected that there will be some new instruction for the soldiers.

La Grande's company will leave on a special train made up at Baker, after leaving La Grande where both Company E and the Headquarters unit from Union will board the train—the troop carrier will go on west, stopping at Pendleton and The Dalles to pick up the other companies of the Second Battalion.

MRS. PIERCE SPEAKER AT ROTARY CLUB

Mrs. Walter M. Pierce, member of the state board of higher education, was the speaker at today's meeting of the Rotary club in the La Grande hotel. She explained many of the problems which are now before the board, and exhibited the mass of documents which have been produced as a result of a recent survey.

Mrs. Pierce said in part: "I have been interested in higher education for years. When I came to Oregon years ago I found it was quite a task for the leaders to know what to do with the two great colleges, located just 40 miles apart. The consensus now is that the only way to avoid duplication is to have one head. The better state we find the amount about \$6,000,000. Of this amount about \$6,000,000 is derived from state funds. Of the balance, about \$1,700,000 come from students' fees. The first question that came to the board is the question of duplication and the possibility of eliminating as much of it as possible. It is my idea that not one cent should be cut from normal school appropriations until they are brought up to a certain standard. After a careful investigation it seems that Oregon is doing its educational task very well but doing it expensively. In comparison with the record of 17 other states we find the per capita cost is very nearly twice that of the other states."

"The administrative expense of our two institutions is 8.5 per cent as compared with 4 per cent for those of other states."

Mrs. Pierce's address was very interesting and created much favorable comment.

In addition to several local visitors, there were present two Rotarians, Dean J. Hanson, of Seattle, and Dan E. Gould, of Portland. C. D. Thomas, of Twin Falls, Idaho, also attended.

GRANDORPS SHARPLY IN ALL MARKETS

Parting of Ways Reached Between Old Crop and New Crop Dealings.

UNCLE SAM NOT PURCHASING NOW

Rallies Noted in Most Cities Before Closing—George S. Milnor is Interviewed.

CHICAGO, June 3 (AP)—Spectacular downward swings of grain prices today accompanied announcements that in the judgment of the federal farm board the parting of the ways had been reached between old crop dealings and the new 1931 domestic crop.

Definite word from official sources was received that government sponsored agencies were not buying wheat in any market, and in some cases prices quickly fell more than 13 cents a bushel.

It had been promised that buying support for cash wheat prices by farm board allies would continue until new wheat started moving in the southwest, but authentic advices were received today that 40 to 50 bushels an acre of new wheat were harvested in Texas, and was moving rapidly to market. Withdrawal of government sponsored buying support for June wheat contracts and for cash wheat, followed and with the collapse of quotations the market here and at other leading centers became semi-demoralized.

The maximum fall of prices in Chicago, 5 1/2 cents for June wheat, was greatly exceeded in Minneapolis, Duluth and Kansas City. Other Chicago deliveries than June showed at times 2 1/2-3 1/2 cents maximum drops. Wheat closed nervous, with the market lower than yesterday's finish. Corn ranged from 1/2 cents to 3/4 cent lower than yesterday's finish. Corn closed 1/2 off to 1/4 up, oats 1/4 down, and provisions varying from 2 cents decline to a rise of 30 cents.

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WESTERN SPORTS ARENA FEATURE

Stock Show Program to Include Racing, Bucking Horses, Roping.

Characteristic western sports will typify the arena sports events of the Eastern Oregon Livestock Show at Union June 10-11-12 according to the announcement of M. L. Biedler, chairman of a special committee. Bucking horses always make Eastern Oregon people rise up in their seats and cheer, sometimes for the horse and sometimes for the rider, while the rodeo events of bucking, roping and bull riding are scheduled to provide added excitement.

"The arena events are designed to entertain the stock show crowds, but also to encourage our own Eastern Oregon riders to take part," states Mr. Biedler. "Those wishing to participate in the events listed should get in touch with the sports committee before the show."

During the past school year 149 grade school pupils were neither absent nor tardy, and thus earned perfect attendance certificates. This number amounts to practically ten per cent of the total enrollment of La Grande grade schools. The list appears below.

The total enrollment of all La Grande public schools reached the highest figure in history, according to the report for the month of May. The high school total was 727, and that of the grade schools was 1684, making a combined enrollment of 2411.

Attendance in all schools during the month of May was unusually good: 1551 students were neither absent nor tardy during the month. Of that number being high school students. The percentage of attendance in the grade schools was 97.9, while that of the high school was 99.2.
