No Protest From U. S. On Tariff Rates in Canada

WASHINGTON, June 3 (AP)—Secretary Stimson indicated today that the United States would not protest to the Ottawa government against the new Canadian tariff rates. The American government considers the tariff a purely domestic question, the secretary said. He added that he had not yet studied the new Canadian rates. The secretary gave this indication after a preliminary meeting with Chairman Jettie House of the Democratic national executive committee that his party would accept the tariff as an issue in the near future, when returning to La Grande for a few days stay. State to Fight Receivership of Guardian Group

PORTLAND, Ore., June 3 (AP)—Attorneys representing the Guardian group of four Portland savings and loan companies, which went into voluntary receivership yesterday, marked time today while waiting for State Corporation Commissioner James Mott to file a motion asking that the receivership be set aside. The four companies have aggregate assets of approximately \$4,500,000. Hal S. Lusk, Multnomah county equity judge, appointed John P. Kavanaugh, Portland attorney, receiver for the group upon a complaint filed by Jay S. Moltzer, principal stockholder and attorney. Later Mott announced he would ask the receivership order be set aside on the ground it was obtained by fraud in withholding from the judge the fact that the corporation department had taken over the companies. Mott said three of the associations had been taken over by his office May 26.

FIRE CHIEFS MEET TODAY AT CORVALLIS

CORVALLIS, Ore., June 3 (AP)—Opening of a four day session, fire chiefs of Oregon met here today for their annual convention and for the annual state fireman's school. William E. Ringold, Pendleton fire chief, is president of the association. The first session was devoted to memorial service honoring the late Tom Graham, veteran chief of Corvallis, who was head of the service for 27 years. Graham was the force behind the movement to provide actual scientific schooling for firemen. The Oregon State college school of engineering is co-operating with the fire chiefs this year in discussions and exhibits of scientific fire fighting. Other officers of the association are: C. J. Baughman, Ashland, first vice president; J. F. Volstroff, second vice; James Fletcher, Roseburg, treasurer; Lester Davis, deputy fire marshal, Salem, secretary; and Iva L. Pearson, McMinnville, Roy Elliott, Medford, and E. L. Boatwright, Portland, trustees.

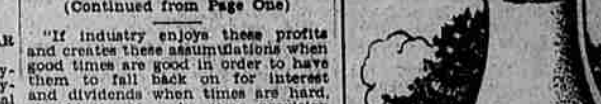
