Capt. MacReady Comments About Altitude Flights

PHOENIX, Ariz., June 3 (AP)—Captain John A. MacReady, former United States army flier of note, four times holder of the world altitude record, expressed puzzlement yesterday over the widespread excitement aroused by the invasion of the stratosphere by the German scientists, Auguste Piccard and Charles Kipfer, in a free balloon.

"I did a good deal of experimenting for the army in the stratosphere," he said, "and collaborated with scientists. I have made ten flights of more than 35,000 feet and 50 at more than 30,000 feet. At 35,000 feet I have encountered 80 degrees below zero Fahrenheit in temperature, and have found it growing warmer 3,000 feet above the earth's denser air blanket soon will be practicable.

"The problem faced in developing commercial airplane flights in the stratosphere is one of overcoming lack of oxygen and of furnishing sufficient pressure to give the engine enough air to work full power, MacReady said.

"You take a motor of 410 horsepower, the old Liberty," he said, "it will not operate at all at 35,000 feet.

Plant Yields Rare Chemical To Aid U. S. Fight Disease

WASHINGTON (AP)—A fragile plant known scientifically as "Lupinus albus" has made the United States independent of the foreign supply of asparagin—a rare substance valuable in tuberculosis research.

Dr. Marion Dorset, chief of the biologic division, U. S. bureau of animal industry, said in announcing the commercial manufacture of the chemical that asparagin heretofore has been imported at a cost of about \$20 a pound, principally from Germany.

Lupinus, little known to this country, are valuable soil restorers when plowed under as the American farmer uses alfalfa and other green crops to enrich his land.

Investigations which brought about the discovery that asparagin could be produced in this country were started by Dr. Dorset three years ago.

Asks Catholics To Use Peaceful Means

MEXICO CITY, June 3 (AP)—Monseigneur Leopoldo Ruiz y Flores, apostolic delegate to Mexico, called upon Catholics in this country yesterday to avoid political meetings behind closed doors held in the guise of literary reunions.

"No one can remain satisfied with the present precarious condition of the Catholic church in Mexico," the monseigneur said in a public statement, "but the remedy is in use of peaceful measures without provoking greater conflict and without the necessity of forming a political party."

German President Dedicates Memorial

BERLIN, June 3 (AP)—President Von Hindenburg, in the uniform of a field marshal, with full decorations, yesterday dedicated the "Neue Wache," or new guardhouse, near the old imperial palace as a monument to Prussian soldiers who died in the World war.
