Italian Boxers Lose To U.S.A. Fighters, 5 to 2

NEW YORK, June 4 (AP)—International friendship between Italy and the United States has received little if any impetus through the series of boxing bouts between the amateurs of the two nations.
The first time the team clashed in Madison Square Garden, each won four bouts, a result that was satisfactory to both sides. Last night they met again and after one of the stormiest scenes the best battle pit ever has seen, the United States came out ahead, five bouts to two, but with the friendly feeling between the ring rivals easily battered.
The first bout went against the Italian flyweight, Edwidge Rodriguez, and a storm of protest arose from spectators and from the visiting team, although the decision appeared fair to impartial ringside observers. The crowd of 5000 protested loudly and the indignant Italian boxers marched from the arena.
The spectators took up the battle and several fights broke out in the arena. Ringfighters were subjected to a bombardment of everything throwable, including a couple of small stones. Police finally restored order and after a half hour delay the Italian boxers were persuaded to continue. But Joe Jones, the referee who, with good judgment, had voted the decision over Rodriguez to Louis Salica of New York, insisted on dropping out of the picture.
Vincenzo Baldi promptly evoked the series by defeating Flavio De Bonis, Boston 118-pounder, but the four American recorded wins to clinch the victory. It was the first time the Italians had lost a team since they captured the Olympic championship in 1928.

Iodine In Soil Sought To Aid War On Goiter

NEW ORLEANS (AP)—South Carolina's exploitation of its iodine-rich soil has been the subject of a hunt for the drug.
Discovery that vegetables grown in South Carolina soil contain more iodine than those grown elsewhere has resulted in the state's automobile license tags bearing the legend, "The Iodine State."
Now Hal W. Moselle, professor of chemistry at Tulane university is directing tests to determine if Louisiana does not have a similar advantage.
W. E. Merrill, graduate instructor in chemistry, conducts the tests. Vegetables are ground up in a machine and the mass is pressed into small sticks which are dried in an electric oven. The dry sticks are heated in a silica combustion furnace in an atmosphere of oxygen. The resulting gases and residue are caught in glass receptacles and analyzed for the iodine content.
An iodine map, showing the relative iodine content in vegetables in every parish of the state, is the ultimate object of the experiment.
All parishes in lower Louisiana once were a part of the Gulf of Mexico. Tests already indicate that large amounts of iodine will be found in the sea-soaked soil products.
Florida is another state that has made limited iodine tests.

PORTLAND, Ore., June 4 (AP)—Famer Bob Kruse and Joe Malcewicz wrestled to a draw here last night, each taking a fall. Kruse substituted for Dr. Karl Sarpollis who was unable to reach Portland from San Francisco in time.
Tra Dorn, Salt Lake, defeated Count Michael Metanoff, Russian heavy-weight two out of three falls in a hard match.
Kruse took his fall in 21 seconds with a quick series of wristlocks. Malcewicz evaded the counter in the fourth round with a fast body slam. Dorn won the first fall from Getsonoff in 14 minutes with a flying headlock. The count came back to take the second fall with a bear hug in 6 minutes, 13 seconds. Dorn surprised his 216-pound opponent by holding him for an airplane pass to take the deciding fall in exactly one minute.
Chet Wiles took one fall and the decision from Ted Lang, University of Washington in the preliminary.

Bugs Imported to Battle Sugar Pest
NEW YORK, June 4 (AP)—Ten thousand bugs, with big appetites for a certain insect that destroys Louisiana sugar cane, have arrived in New Orleans. Pan American Airways announced yesterday, after a 4,000 mile trip by air and rail from Lima, Peru, that on their arrival in Louisiana, they were deployed along a 10-mile front. Reinforcements will be brought up from Peru as needed.

Boxing Receipts Improve
SACRAMENTO, Cal. (AP)—March, with the exception of January, when new license fees were collected, returned the largest receipts to the state athletic commission since last August. The total collected was \$12,069.78.

PORTLAND, Ore., June 4 (AP)—Graduate managers, coaches, athletic directors, faculty representatives and publicity men of Pacific coast conference schools gathered here today for their annual summer meeting to draw up 1932 playing schedules and iron out any sport problems.
The most important problem facing the graduate managers and faculty men was a final decision on the athletic "commissioner" idea. A year ago the graduate managers voted to elect a commissioner, but the faculty men opposed the plan. The plan was turned over to the faculty representatives who set it aside for consideration at this meeting.

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Senators Strive To Keep Up With World Champions

Although their cause seems more or less hopeless in the face of the Athletics' phenomenal streak, Walter Johnson's Washington Senators are living up to their promise to give the champions a run for their money in an American league game.
The Senators, in fact, have done as well as Johnson predicted they would when he envisioned a pennant this spring. His only mistake was in figuring the Athletics were due to burn out a bearing. The champions displayed no symptoms of slipping yesterday as they registered their thirty-third victory in their last twenty-six starts. Lefty Grove, pitching his eighth straight win, let the Chicago White Sox down with six hits and beat them 2 to 1.

Washington kept pace with its second straight over the visiting firemen from Detroit, also by a 2 to 1 margin. Bob Burke, young southpaw, allowed only three hits to beat Vic Sorrell in a tight mound duel. The Senators bunched three of their blows to score both their runs in the first inning, courtesy of Sam Rice and Cronin did the work.
Joe Vondrak, rookie outfielder, cracked a home run in the eleventh inning, gave the Cleveland Indians their victory over the Sox, 5 to 4. The Sox had scored four times in the eighth to tie the count.

SALEM, June 4 (AP)—Remodeling of the supreme court, for which the state legislature appropriated \$5800, was authorized by the state board of control yesterday. The work, with W. C. Knighton as architect, will be done as soon as possible, the plans to be approved by the secretary of state.
M. Distler, representing the American building maintenance company, appeared before the board to present his plan for the janitor service of the state capital group, which the firm claims can be accomplished at a saving of \$23,500 during the biennium.
The representatives were authorized to take the matter up with Secretary of State Hal E. Howe, who is also state building custodian. A conference on the proposal was being held late today.
Distler states the saving can be made with virtually the same janitor personnel and without reduction of wages. Very few changes would be made in the staff, he announced. The matter of effecting this economy was proposed by Governor Julius L. Meier, who introduced the conference between the firm and the secretary of state.
