The former deputy district attorney, accused of killing Charles Crawford, boss politician and Herbert Spencer, an associate and former newspaper man, remained in jail last night, unable to post the \$100,000 bond set for his release.

She indicated, he added, that she saw an opportunity for publicity.

Daughter of Ranger Dies In Portland

PORTLAND, Ore., June 4 (AP)—Mrs. Ina Tinsley Desmond, 71, daughter of the late Captain W. J. Howard, last of the famous California rangers, died here Tuesday night. She underwent a major operation two weeks ago.
She was born on her father's Mariop ranch. Following her marriage to C. J. Desmond, she lived for many years in Northern Mexico where Desmond was an official of the Mexican central railway. Desmond died in 1910 and Mrs. Desmond came to Oregon.
Her father was one of the first to volunteer for the ranger force organized by Captain Harry Love in 1850 to combat Mexican raiders.
Mrs. Desmond is survived by four brothers and one sister, W. J. Howard, Grants Pass; Royal T. Howard, Sacramento; H. H. Howard, Canby; Guy, Cuba; Dr. Victor S. Howard, Madras, Ore.; and Dr. Della B. Howard, Portland.

Reckless Driving Charges Dropped

SALEM, June 4 (AP)—Charges of reckless driving against William Hammond, in charge of the operator's division of the motor vehicle department of the state, following an accident ten days ago in which Howard Smalley was injured, had been dropped because of lack of prosecution, it was learned here yesterday.

NO HIDING PLACE

The number of subjects on which it is thought proper to give children information has been extended a great deal in recent years. But still there are a good many things concerning which it would be much better if children could be kept ignorant but of which, nevertheless, they are well aware.

Once a child is able to read, there is no way of keeping him from knowledge of the more sordid manifestations of human nature. It is impossible for the average child who does not live in some hidden far-away spot not to be curious about crime and corruption, about all the ugly happenings which assault his consciousness on every hand.

How shall we deal with his questions about such matters? To ignore or to silence him is simple enough, but it accomplishes nothing. It only drives him to find out in other ways.

Much better it is to summon our tact and courage and answer him with such ease and frankness that he not only will be satisfied, but will come back to us when he wishes to know more.

It is comforting to realize how much unsuitable knowledge a child can acquire without hurt provided it is given to him in the proper spirit.

A sordid happening loses its shock for him if he knows his wonderings about it to someone who is poised, sane and good. He sees that such things in no way upset the people to whom he looks for guidance and his own attitude is modeled on theirs.

An honest answer wisely given helps him to accept this sort of ugliness as he has learned to accept other unattractive realities — without loss of poise.
