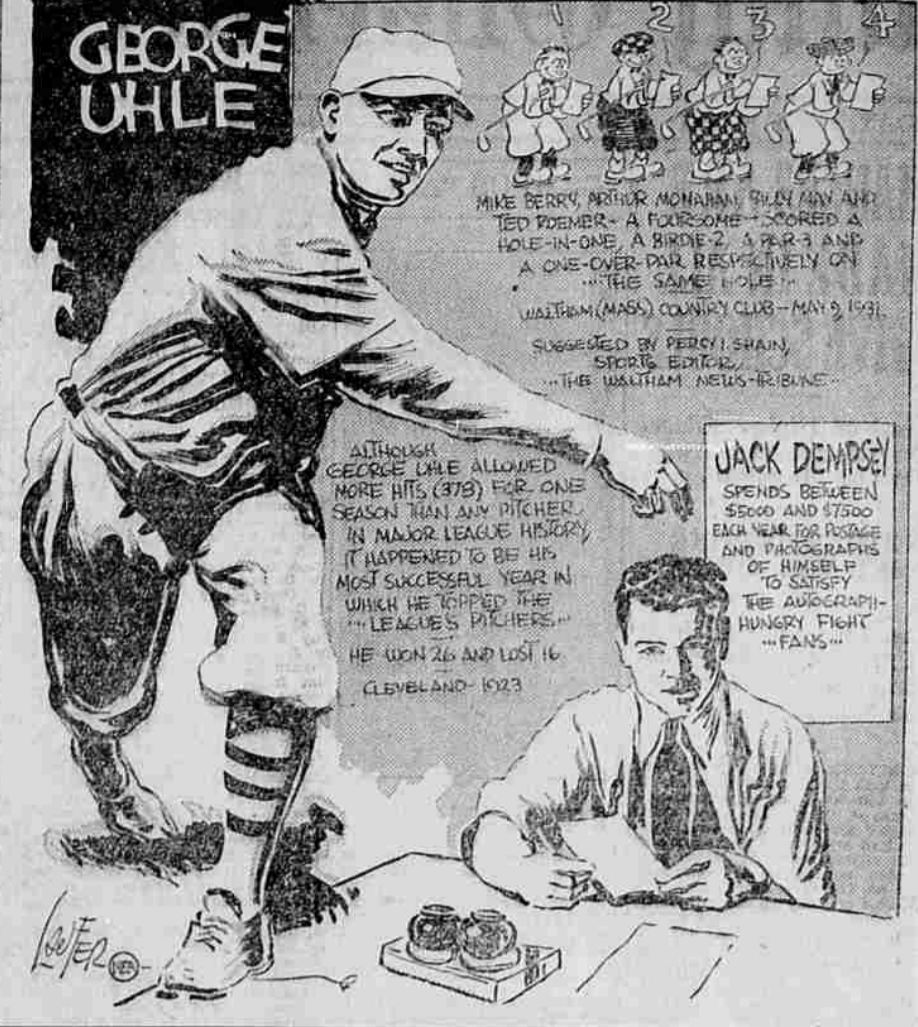

Easterner May Be Selected As Pacific "Czar"

PORTLAND, June 8 (AP)—An eastern or middle western man will likely be chosen to fill the Pacific Coast conference "high commissioner" position created Saturday when graduate managers and faculty representatives of the organization voted at their final meeting here to employ a "czar" to supervise athletics.

To satisfy all ten schools in the conference it was the general opinion of the officials that they will have to go east to get the man for the job.

The faculty men decided to give the recommendations of the graduate managers a one-year try. They voted to employ a commissioner for a year who would assist in the consideration of proposals confronting the conference and make recommendations on the basis of which a determination may be made as to future policies and methods of administration.

The graduate managers had hoped that the man would be appointed for three years and be given full power to name officials for all contests and act as arbitrator in athletic problems. They believe that this will eventually be the outcome of the action.

Prof. William Owens, of Stanford, president of the faculty body, was appointed to name a committee of three school officials to select the man and name his salary.

Need Unanimous Approval Before the commissioner will be put in office, however, he will have to receive the unanimous approval of all ten schools.

The graduate managers and faculty men closed their three-day meeting Saturday after drawing up the 1932 conference football schedule and voting on the commissioner plan. This was the first time the grid program has been arranged at the summer session. Heretofore it has been drawn up at the winter conference.

Other business including picking officials for athletic games, arranging northern division basketball, baseball, track, golf and tennis schedules, and fixing dual meet dates in several sports, was also cleaned up at the meeting.

The school officials meet again in their winter session at San Francisco in December. The next summer conference will be held in Los Angeles, instead of in a northern city, as account of the Olympic games. It has been set for late in July, 1932.

CANDIDATES FOR WORLD GAMES



JESSE MORTENSEN Clarence (Bud) Houser, who set a new Olympic record of 135 feet 2 1/2 inches for the discus at Amsterdam, Lee Barnes, present holder of the pole vault record at 1 feet 1 1/2 inches, and Jesse Mortensen, one of Troy's greatest letter-men, are the three mucksters.

Strange as it may seem, Mortensen, who failed to win a place on the 1928 team, appears to be the greatest potential prospect as a decathlon man. Houser is faced with the embarrassing fact that Eric Kraenz and Paul Jempus have hurled the discus more than ten feet beyond his Olympic record.

Barnes placed fifth in the 1928 games' pole vault, and even though he was in retirement two years he has beat his way back to 13 feet 11 inches this spring. His comeback trail does not appear to be so long as that facing Houser, for no one has eclipsed his mark.

Mortensen flashed back into the picture recently by running through the ten decathlon events to gain a total of 8,019.4 points, 237.4 better than the existing American record and only 33.29 short of the world mark set at Amsterdam by the Finn, Paavo Yrjola.

The performance is all the more remarkable in view of the fact that Mortensen threw the javelin only 131 feet, whereas he won the National A. A. U. title in 1929 in this event with a toss of more than 204 feet.

Mortensen, in addition to his track activities, was a good backfield man on the football squad and a great center on the 1930 Pacific Coast conference championship basketball team.

The former Trojans will all compete for the Los Angeles Athletic club in the National A. A. U. meet at Lincoln in July.

Chicago Cubs In Second; Win 12 Out of Fifteen

By Hugh S. Fullerton Jr. (Associated Press Sports Writer) Chicago's Cubs finally appear to have hit their stride. They flourished during the middle of May, losing eight games out of ten in one group. In the past two weeks they have turned a new leaf, winning 12 of their last 15 games and climbing into second place. In this streak they have been hitting hard and some fine mound work by Bob Smith, who has won four consecutive games, and Lester Sweetland has helped considerably.

They passed the New York Giants yesterday with an 8 to 3 victory in a game that was stopped by rain in the sixth inning. Hornsby and Hack Wilson hit home runs.

The St. Louis Cardinals lost a half game from their margin of leadership but remained four games ahead of Chicago as they divided a double header with the Brooklyn Robins. Lanny Vance held the champions to five hits in the opener which Brooklyn won 6 to 4, but Bill Hallahan stopped the Robins in the second game with six hits for a 9 to 0 triumph.

Reds Win 3 Straight Cincinnati ran its best winning streak to five games by defeating Boston 8 to 2 in the first half of a double bill as Red Lucas pitched a six hit game but the Braves reversed the decision in part two by 10 to 9 in a free hitting affair that saw nine pitchers at work.

Three of the four American league games furnished an interesting study in contrasts between the winners and losers. The fourth was a slug-fest match the Philadelphia Athletics trounced Detroit 12 to 2. Detroit had 18 men left on bases.

The three winning teams in the other games collected a total of 35 hits while the three losers could get only 15. Lloyd Brown of Washington held the Chicago White Sox to four hits for an 8 to 1. Danny McFadden, Boston's best-pitched star, beat the St. Louis Braves 6 to 3 with a five hit pitching job. Vernon Gomez, Yankee southpaw, won his fifth consecutive game by checking Cleveland with six hits while Babe Ruth led the way to a 5 to 1 victory. The Babe defied the presentation jinx by making five hits, driving in three runs and stealing a base just after receiving a plaque in recognition of his sportsmanship and his good influence in baseball.
