142-Mile Loop Recommended—
The road from Weston to Elgin can at present be negotiated in its complete length by automobile, according to Claudia J. Benson of the Oregon Motor association office, who says that many inquiries about the road have been coming to her. From Pendleton to Weston the route is over paved highway, and good gravel exists from Weston to McDougall Camp. There is a ten-mile stretch between the camp and Toltgate that is not graded, and except for six miles of gravel west of Elgin the rest of the distance to the latter place, 28 miles, is in very poor condition. Mrs. Benson stated that a crew of forestry men will begin general repair work on this stretch July 1, it is reported, and with the removal of boulders, bridge repair and some grading, the road is expected to be in fair condition. After reaching Elgin auto drivers may return to Pendleton by way of La Grande, making a 142-mile loop. The dis-

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Submarine Sunk In Collision; 18 British Missing

LONDON, June 9 (AP)—The Admiralty announced today that the British submarine, Poseidon, one of the largest in the fleet, had been sunk in a collision near Weihaiwei, on the north shore of the Shantung peninsula in China.

Five officers and 26 men were aboard but only three were rescued. Eighteen men were missing.

The submarine collided with a merchant vessel, 21 miles north of Weihaiwei early this afternoon.

The Admiralty announcement said vessels which had gone to the scene of the collision included the Berwick, Cumberland and Hermes.

The Poseidon was launched at Barrow, England, on June 21, 1929. She was 360 feet long with a 38 foot beam. Her armament consisted of one 4-inch gun and eight 21-inch torpedo tubes, six forward and two aft. Her sister ships are the Pandora, the Perseus and the Proteus, all built at about the same time.

The accident is the second of its kind within the past month.

A Russian submarine sank during maneuvers in the Gulf of Finland during fleet maneuvers. The Soviet government has been reluctant to discuss that accident but other vessels of the fleet have been damaged by the collision.

FLAG SERVICES WILL BE HELD AT CITY PARK

The history of the Stars and Stripes, the symbol of American democracy and prosperity, will be recounted in an impressive service Sunday afternoon at 2:30 in the pavilion at Riverside park in the annual ceremony conducted by the Elks. The ceremony has in previous years been held in the Elks temple. Public and citizens of La Grande and vicinity are urged to attend. The observance of Flag day by Elks lodges has been mandatory since the lodge was founded over 50 years ago. The lodge has broadened its membership, but loyal adherence to the observance of Flag day is still one of the leading ideals. Judge H. E. Brady, chairman of the Flag day committee, stated today: A. S. Grant, of Baker, is to be the main speaker on the program, addressing the audience on a patriotic subject. Mr. Grant is a fluent speaker and this will be his first public appearance in La Grande although he has spoken in the court room at the Union county court house many times in the capacity of attorney. The beginning of the flag and many important events in which it has played an important part will be recounted in the ritualistic ceremony conducted by Exalted Ruler Sharrowood Williams. Vocal selections by Mrs. T. R. Maxwell and E. E. Hurley will add to the impressive ceremony.

BODY IS RECOVERED

EUGENE, June 9 (AP)—The body of Oscar Olson, who with Rex Brown, drowned in the Willamette river March 31 when their rowboat capsized in the swollen stream, was recovered yesterday 300 feet from the scene of the accident. Brown's body has not been recovered. Two other men saved themselves.
