Bees Swarming—Bees are swarming, according to reports out at the VonSchwinkler apiary at Island City. Mr. VonSchwinkler has a great many stands of bees, having purchased the Rollins stands a year or two ago and we believe must have one of the largest honey factories in the county.

Morning Glory Pest—Spraying morning glories with calcium chlorate in Union county in 1930 at the rate of 3 pounds of chemical to each square rod has apparently secured a good kill in plots on several farms examined recently. The work on which results have been checked was done by the county-owned spray machine. A general survey of the results secured will be completed in May and June. Spray work for 1931 will be done during

late August and September which is considered the most effective period. Spray material has been purchased by the county court this year at a cost 20 per cent below last year and will be available for use by the county spray machine or will be sold at cost to farmers who wish to do their own spraying.—Farm Bulletin.

INDIANS DEFEAT YANKS IN NINTH

Draw Up to Within a Game of Third Place — Grove Wins Tenth Game

Charles Rufus Ruffing, of the Yankees, saw enough of the Cleveland Indians within about five minutes yesterday afternoon to last him the rest of his natural life. If the redhead never sees Roger Peckinpaugh's wreckers again it doubtless will suit him fine.

The disappointed Mr. Ruffing sorely for eight innings they were so docile he was almost ashamed to take the money. During that interval they obtained just one single. The Yankees, meantime, had grouped two of their three hits off Wes Ferrell to score a run in the fifth.

The Indians jumped the reservation in the ninth. Dick Porter started with a triple down the left line, whereupon Johnny Hodapp singled to bring him in. Earl Averil belted a homer into the bleachers and before the uprising subsided Morgan had drawn a walk and loped in on Myatt's triple. That was how it ended, 4 to 1, and the Indians had moved within a game of third place.

In addition to marking Ferrell's ninth victory in eleven games, the triumph gave the tribe 12 out of its last 14 and five out of seven for its present eastern invasion. Joe Sewell, former Cleveland third baseman, punched two of the Yanks' three hits off Ferrell.

Lefty Grove and Jimmy Fox divided honors as the Athletics maddled the Detroit Tigers again, 7 to 3. Grove, allowing seven hits, four of them by Mark Koenig, became the first pitcher in either league to register ten victories this year. He had dropped out on Earl Whitehill with a brace of homers and a single, driving in four.

Walt Stewart southpawed the Boston Red Sox into submission, 4 to 0, pulling the Browns out of the American League cellar. It was Stewart's seventh victory.

Senators Swap Sox.
An eight-run outburst in the second inning featured Washington's 18 to 4 win over the Chicago White Sox. For the eighth straight game the Senators used only one pitcher. Bob Burke limiting the Sox to eight hits, one of them a homer by Kerr. Ossie Blügg, Senator third baseman, had a perfect day with four singles.

The New York Giants won their second victory out of seven starts in the west when crafty Clarence Mitchell set the Cubs down 6 to 1. Mitchell, who incidentally pitched his team's other win, allowed five hits, two of the scratch variety. The Giants, led by Bill Terry with four hits, pounded Pat Malone fairly.

Rain prevented the only other tilt scheduled in the National, that between the Phillies and Pirates at Pittsburgh.

Ten Amateurs In Nation Qualify For Golf Play

NEW YORK, June 9.—Ten amateurs were qualified for the national open golf championship, starting at the Inverness club, Toledo, Ohio, July 2.

The principal hopes among the simon-pures will be George Voigt and T. Philip Perkins, of New York, the latter a former British amateur champion. The other amateurs who have gained a place in the field are George Dawson and Johnny Lehman, of Chicago; Lester Holstad, of St. Paul; Tom Cooley, of Tucson, Ariz.; Joe Pazzullo, of Wanumetown, Pa.; L. Chester O'Brien and Bryan Winter, of St. Louis; and Sam Parks Jr., of Pittsburgh.

Originally 55 professionals, given exemptions from qualifying play, automatically moved into the Inverness starting field without swinging a club. Yesterday the other 36 places were filled with nation-wide 36-hole qualifying rounds in 20 districts.

The exempt list included all those who finished in the first 30 and ties at Interlachen last year and a host of foreign players, including the ten members of the British Ryder cup team.

Two veterans, Al Espinosa of Chicago, and Willy Cox, of Brooklyn, carried off individual honors in yesterday's qualifying rounds. Espinosa compiled the lowest 36-hole total in the country, 135, to lead the Chicago district. Cox broke the south course record at the Westchester club at Rye, N. Y., with a 64 in his first round and then added a 74 in the second round to lead the New York district by a wide margin.

Espinosa's 135 was made up of one round of 70 and another of 65. Two former open champions, Willie MacFarlane and Cyril Walker, failed to qualify at Westchester and so did the veteran Mike Brady, runner-up for the title in 1911 and 1919.
