

Eggs Higher In Oregon Market; Supply Is Less

PORTLAND, June 12 (AP) — Market for eggs showed an advance effective at the opening of the trading today. It appeared mostly the result of a desire on the part of local co-ops to add producers market expenses than any actual need of the market to pay more for its supplies.

The price of extras was advanced 1c by the Pacific co-ops in the face of underselling by outsiders. At the same time he moved up the price of standards and mediums 2c doz. This was due to the fact that recently there was an advance of 1c in ex-

tras while others remained unchanged.

Decreasing supplies of eggs are shown at practically all points along the coast but this is not being felt because of the decreasing call. However quality is getting scarcer each day.

Masks of butter continues to decrease locally and a rather liberal decrease in late arrivals is reflected in the trade. Market is steady with no change in general values.

Market for live poultry remains its recent weakness but the movement appears fairly favorable with the extreme low values. Light hens are especially weak on account of the very poor quality.

There was no general change in the price of country killed meats today. All lines are considered fairly steady at late price reductions except calves which appear fully steady for quality.

Some damage to the quality of Oregon lettuce is reflected as a result of alternate rain and sunshine during the last few days. This has hurt the shipping demand somewhat.

Very good movement of oranges is reported. Greatest call is in small sizes on account of the extremely low price but the movement is unusually good in all sizes. Grapefruit is a

trifle slow on account of the low price of cantaloupes.

Greater movement of Labish celery is reported both in the local territory and for mixed car shipments as far as Montana. Quality and size are both improving. Local sales to retailers around \$1.00 to \$1.75 dozen according to quality.

Market for cauliflower is very slow with practically no shipping demand. Quality is not very good as a rule and this has not only stopped outside sales but has hurt the home movement even with receding prices. Watermelon prices are again lower.

Cantaloupe prices are again receding; down 35c crate.

Green beans from The Dalles are scarce; another car from California due Monday.

Cherry market remains very sluggish with prices tending low.

Fish markets are reported practically unchanged.

Movement of bothhouse tomatoes with prices steady.

Good local peas are scarce but prices are low all around. Seattle reported around 3c for its telephones. Strawberries were slightly weaker and lower.

Fresh figs are in liberal supply. Some fancy white stuff from California reported.

New and old potatoes are about steady.

Gooseberries continue practically off the market. Call is good.

Lettuce sales were fairly steady at unchanged prices.

Cabbage market was dull but unchanged in price.

Cherries were dull with sales 5c for most pie stock and 5-6c for Annes. Cauliflower was very slow sales with considerable offered. Most at \$1.00 to \$1.25 crate; the latter being an extreme for its.

Root vegetables offerings were extremely liberal but there was no change in general prices.

New potatoes sold fairly well at \$1 box for 30s and 40s.

Old potatoes sold slowly at late prices.

Gooseberries were in demand with none in sight.

Lettuce quality continues with sales mostly 75-85c crate.

Oregon Berries In National Field

PORTLAND, June 12 (AP) — For the first time in the history of the industry, Oregon will this year enter the national distribution field in raspberries.

Announcement was made here today that the Gresham Berry Growers' association had agreed with the carload shipping department of the Pacific Fruit & Produce company to market the product of the Gresham organization.

Wide distribution for the Oregon fruit is predicted, and up to one hundred carloads are expected to move out of the local territory.

The Gresham raspberries will be packed in 24 basket flat crates instead of in strawberry crates. It was found that in this way the fruit ships better and quality and appearance retained.

Picking will start Monday. Hundreds of pickers will be employed.

Many Offerings On The East Side

PORTLAND, June 12 (AP) — Offerings filled the huge building of the east side farmers' market today. Space two blocks long by one block wide was overfull with fruits and vegetables.

Berries of all sorts were in abundance. Strawberry offerings were surprisingly liberal. Sales were lower with a general spread of \$1.10 to \$1.75 crate with the bulk of the good fruit \$1.50 crate.

Raspberry offerings were very liberal, increased with sales mostly \$1.50 to \$1.75 crate, a few higher.

Loganberries sold \$1.50 to \$1.75 crate with few above \$1.50 to \$1.60.

Peas were in better supply and were a trifle easier at 5-6c lb.

"The foreign markets are distinctly dull and prices if anything in favor of the buyer."

"In the west, wool continues to move more or less steadily from first hands at about the same rates noted a week ago, both by outright sale and on consignment."

"Mohair is rather slow and prices unchanged."

Girl Slain Due To Knowledge Of Case, Is Belief

LONDON, June 12 (AP) — Rudolph Haybrook, artist, was quoted by the Daily Mail today as saying he believed Starr Faithfull had been slain in New York because she was to have been the principal witness in a \$25,000 settlement case which would have caused a sensation when it came to court.

(Stanley E. Faithfull, her stepfather, had denied this statement is true.)

Identifying Haybrook as Miss Faithfull's closest friend in London and as the fiancé of her sister Elizabeth, the paper further quoted him to the effect that there were influential people in New York who were concerned in the case and to whom her death would have been a matter of importance.

The Daily Express said Scotland Yard was searching for a man whom Miss Faithfull had sought repeatedly during a visit to London in 1928.

NEW YORK, June 12 (AP) — Investigation of the drowning of Miss Starr Faithfull, whose diary tells of experiencing every thrill, reached the grand jury stage today.

Elvin N. Edwards, district attorney of Nassau county, said he would call 15 witnesses at Minola.

Because of new clues which he thought warranted grand jury consideration, Edwards caused cremation of the girl's body to be postponed suddenly yesterday.

MAROONED ON MUD FLAT

OAKLAND, Cal., June 12 (AP) — Three girls and eight boys marooned overnight on a mud flat on the Alameda county shore of San Francisco bay received food and magazines by airplane today.

The children, ranging in age from 8 to 18 were marooned yesterday when their launch was grounded in the receding tide.

They were rescued by coast guardsmen shortly after noon today.

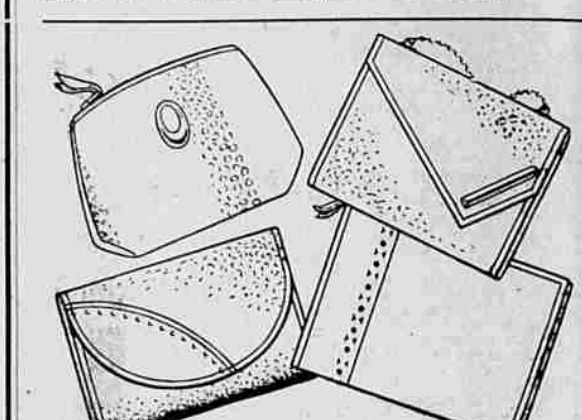
