NEW YORK, June 12 (AP)—The trans-Atlantic sportsmanship between trans-Atlantic fliers, founded in 1937 by Rear Admiral Richard E. Byrd, has been upheld by a woman.

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Plans Are Already Formulated For Next War—Department Hard at Work

WASHINGTON—Detailed plans of war aims for mobilization of men and power and industry when the "next war" breaks out have been formulated by the war department.

Immediate draft of 4,000,000 men and registration of 7,000,000 men within the ages of 21 and 30, creation of a powerful advisory war council, compulsory orders for 15,000 manufacturing plants and special low-profit contracts for purchase of necessary supplies are some of the most important phases of the general war plan.

The war policies commission is now studying drafts of the plan along with proposals made at the recent hearings. This commission was created by congress to make a study and prepare legislation designed to equalize the burdens and minimize the profits of war.

For Major Wars Only Bills drafted by the war department which congress would be expected to pass immediately in case of war include measures making available to the president the man power and material resources of the nation, relating to federal acquisition of private property in emergency, authorizing or creating a bureau of marine war risk insurance, a war mate board and a war finance corporation and a bill covering the draft of man power.

The plans would apply to a major war. General Douglas MacArthur, chief of staff, points out that an emergency involving no more than the regular army, even raised to full strength and strengthened by some national guard units, would cause serious trouble in American life and industry.

Instead of building great cantonments as in the World War the army plans to shelter troops in federal, state, county, municipal and industrial—private buildings.

The director of selective service would maintain close liaison with the army and navy and know when to advance the call for men which he would be required to fill.

About 500 local draft boards of three members each would be functioning in decentralized local board areas each including about 30,000 population.

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Cherry Growers In West Unable To Find Market

SALEM, June 12 (AP)—Cherry growers in this section of the state are unable to find a market for perhaps half of their Royal Anne crop with prices at a standstill, a survey of the market for cherries by the capital journal disclosed.

Cherries are being only a portion of their usual amount and are being sold at a loss, growers are complaining. Thursday morning cherry managers said they had their cherries bought and were not in the market for more fruit.

Attempts are being made to find a market for surplus cherries in the east with the idea of handling as much as possible of the unsold crop in barrels, but brokers and pickers report that there is almost no demand for the surplus.
