That Russia with her enormous area of available wheat land and her great rural population of hard working people accustomed to a simple, not to say low, scale of living would eventually resume her old place as a wheat exporter, has been evident to every student of the grain problem.

portant districts of Russia was highly favorable from seed time to harvest; weather conditions for wheat threshing and market delivery were almost ideal; climatic contribution to an above normal rate of yield was considerable.

The Soviet government is working along a definite and an intelligent program to utilize the natural resources of that great country, and in that program the development of agriculture is the basic factor.

How Russia is Working The weakness of agriculture in pre-war Russia lay in the small size of cultivated holdings and the consequent inability to utilize mechanical power or improved machinery generally.
