

Three Big Games On Grid Program Next Saturday

Utah Plays O. S. C.—Trojans Tackle Washington—South-Methodist Meets St. Mary's Eleven.

By Russell Newland (Associated Press Sports Writer) — SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 30 (AP)— Odds and ends of a thrill-filled football season will be cleaned up this weekend with the final Pacific coast conference game and two inter-sectional struggles to be played.

Southern California's Trojans winners of six conference contests to date and potential champions of the big western circuit, will face Washington's Huskies, at Los Angeles.

While there is nothing in Washington's record so far this season to indicate it has the material to cope with Southern California's known power, Coach Howard Jones is not taking the game lightly. His Trojans will have had two weeks to rest from the hard engagement with Notre Dame while practice has gone on steadily.

Mustangs Meet Gaels In the name of charity, Southern Methodist's Mustangs and St. Mary's Gaels will meet at San Francisco and on the same day and in the same cause, Utah will line up against Oregon State at Portland.

Southern Methodist played to a scoreless tie with Texas Christian, last Saturday, to finish its regular season undefeated and win the southwest conference title. Tariff Equality Is United Plea Of Farm Groups

By Frank L. Weller (Associated Press Farm Editor) — WASHINGTON (AP)—On the eve of a new congress the Farmers' union in the third national farm organization to lift its voice against existing tariffs.

A resolution adopted at the annual convention in Des Moines, Iowa, condemned the Hawley-Smoot tariff act as "not giving us equality" (with industry).

In urging the export debenture the National Grange has renewed its demand, "Tariff for all or tariff for none," and the American Farm Bureau federation, still to hold its annual meeting, has complained of ineffective duties on agricultural imports.

Neither organization has publicly favored such a "retrogressive revision" of rates as the last congress ran into, but they want something done to give the farmer a protected home market or lower the price he pays for his implements and home necessities.

Trade Movement Held Back The thought is said to be pretty general among farmers that, encouraged by the government's action in 1930, the whole world has plunged into a war of countervailing duties which have held back the free movement of trade.

The domestic situation is cited in estimates that from July 1 to Sept. 30 American exports of agricultural products amounted in value to but \$18,000,000 compared with \$280,000,000 a year ago, when even their business wasn't any too good.

While some of this is attributed to lower prices, there is no question that unsettled trade conditions caused a shrinkage in volume as well as in value.

Be that as it may, the period saw a large import balance against the United States in the foreign trade of agricultural products. This country bought \$220,000,000 of farm produce compared with \$291,000,000 last year.

Exports Don't Pay For Imports Non-competitive products, such as silk, tea, coffee, sugar, spices and drugs made up the greater part of these imports, but the fact remains that in the first quarter of the current year exports of products of the soil were not sufficient to pay for imports in the same broad category.

The situation has led to the suggestion from Representative Rainey of Illinois that present tariff rates stand, but that congress enact a bill lowering all schedules, the lower rates to be invoked on any item or group of items by presidential proclamation on notice from the tariff commission that some foreign nation has lowered its rates on the same products.

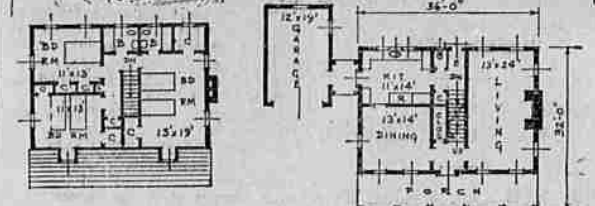

Century of Tradition



By the Associated Press — A house with the appealing charm of a hundred years or more of tradition woven into its design and character is presented in this design.

It is one of the most popular types of small house because of its economy of cost and its livable interior. It is probably safe to say that no more compact design can be made for a house than this one that will retain all the units it has in as small an area.

The living room is spacious indeed, 13x24 feet. The dining room is large and so is the kitchen. A small lavatory in the rear entry may be made more accessible to the living room by inserting a door in the end of that side of the room that leads into the rear hall. The deep coat closet in the front hall can be shortened and the space so cut off may cleverly be used as a dish closet in the dining room wall.

The second floor has a large master's bedroom with private bath and two large clothes closets, one of which might be a cedar closet. Two other bedrooms and a bath complete the second floor.

The exterior is painted white and has dark blue green shutters and double hung windows. The roof is shingle. Chimneys are of brick, and it will be noticed that one is completed and the other decorative to balance the house design. This second one may be amplified at some future time to serve a fireplace in the dining room.

The garage may either be built as shown or placed somewhere on the rear of the lot. It is, however, rather good as located as far as relationship to the house is concerned.

The feature of the house is the porch. This may be enclosed in glass either in whole or in part and serve as a play porch, sun porch or solarium.

The house would be best facing toward the west, although this makes no great difference in this case. The lot should be at least 60x160 feet, and would be more satisfactory if larger, say 75x150 feet.

Estimates vary on this house. They run between \$7000 and \$9000 depending upon local costs for labor and material, and the owner's choice of special material may vary it from these figures.

College Seeking Useful Products From Farm Waste

AMES, Iowa (AP)—Corn stalks, oat hulls and other farm waste materials to the value of a ton an hour are fed into a \$15,000 experimental retort at Iowa State college here.

Destructive distillation of agricultural wastes in an effort to find useful by-products is one phase of a research program being carried on under a \$75,000 federal appropriation.

Distillation products drawn off from the retort include the vapors, later distilled, of methyl alcohol, acetic acid, acetone, and a group of tars, solid charcoal, and a combustible gas which is piped back under the retort for use in heating other contents.

The purpose of the distillation studies is to determine whether agricultural wastes may profitably be substituted for wood in certain departments of industry.
