Grain Markets Suffer Further Decline In Week

WASHINGTON, Nov. 30 (Special) - Domestic cash grain markets continued weak and prices suffered further declines during the week ending Nov. 27, according to the weekly grain market review of the U. S. bureau of agricultural economics. Unsettled financial situation abroad together with the weakness in domestic securities markets, some slackening in export demand for North American wheat and increased offerings of new grain from the southern hemisphere, were principally responsible for the decline in the wheat market. Feed grains turned weaker, influenced largely by the downward trend in wheat prices. Some marketings were relatively light and offerings only about sufficient for current needs. Rice was independently weak, reflecting the lack of export business and the continued slow domestic demand. Flax was lower with wheat and other grains, but the market was rather unsettled and easily influenced by current market developments.

Little Material Change in Cheese

PORTLAND, Nov. 30 (AP) - There was a little material change in the price of situation for cheese throughout the country during the last few days. Local sentiment appears about steady with late consumption somewhat increased as is normal during the holiday period.

Cheese storage holdings throughout the country continue to reflect a liberal decrease as compared with this same period a year ago.

Weather conditions are giving an already good butter trade, even a better appearance. With the late freeze-up, production is expected to show further curtailment in the country generally.

There remains little change in the general egg market situation here for the week's opening. One bad factor is the continued mixing of storage with fresh eggs which enter into competition with the latter.

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Liverpool Wheat Weak
Weakness at Liverpool was the outstanding feature in the general wheat market situation. Wheat for December delivery closed at Liverpool Nov. 27, at 82 1/2c, compared with 80 1/2c a week ago. A part of this decline may be attributed to the lower exchange value of British currency. The pound sterling declined about 2 1/2c during the week, to \$2.52 1/2, on Nov. 27. Prices of foreign wheats at Liverpool were also lower, with No. 1 hard winter from Atlantic ports offered for Nov. shipment at 58 1/2c per bushel, Argentine Rosas at 56 1/2c, and No. 2 Manitoba at 62 1/2c. South Australian wheat was offered at London at 81 1/2c, and No. 1 Manitoba from Vancouver at 69 1/2c per bushel. Continental wheat markets were mostly lower. A moderate business in Russian and Danubian wheat was reported at Dutch markets and the trading was limited in Belgium. French markets were inactive and prices of native wheats declined, despite the French decree effective Nov. 26, raising the domestic milling quota to 97 per cent. There was little activity in Australian markets and the situation was generally weaker in Czechoslovakia. German markets were quiet, with mill inquiry very slow because of slack flour trade. At the close of the market Nov. 27, native wheat was quoted at Hamburg at \$1.52 1/2, at Paris at \$1.56, at Milan, Italy at \$1.42 1/2, per bushel. Russian wheat was quoted at Hamburg at 56c per bushel. Procuring of Russian wheat continued unsatisfactory during November, and seeding of the crop to the middle of November totaled 64 per cent of the total seedings last year. Winter wheat acreage has been increased about 16 per cent in the Ukraine compared with last year, according to preliminary estimates. Black sea shipments totaled 2,488,000 bushels of wheat, of which only 448,000 bushels was of Russian wheat.

Coast Markets Lower
Pacific coast markets were lower, reflecting largely the decline at eastern points. Lack of export demand and limited inquiry from local domestic flour mills were also weakening factors. Receipts at Columbia river and Puget Sound terminals totaled 830 cars compared with 417 cars a year ago. These arrivals, however, were mostly delivered on earlier sales. Two additional lots of 100,000 barrels each were allocated to northwestern mills on the Chinese flour sale during the week, bringing the total to date to 800,000 barrels, or slightly more than half of the total to be milled for that purpose. No export sales were reported for Portland or Seattle, since Oriental needs were being supplied by Australia, at prices under local quotations, according to trade reports. Prices at northwestern markets declined 2-3c, and B. B. bluestem hard white was quoted at Portland Nov. 27 at 78c, and other classes at 61c per bushel, basis No. 1. Bluestem, hard white was quoted at Seattle at 77c, western white at 62c, western red at 63c and hard winter at 64c per bushel, sacked, basis No. 1. Montana dark northern spring in bulk was quoted at 93c per bushel at both Portland and Seattle.
