Negro Music Is Subject Of Talk At Monday Session

Ranging from the simple melody to the tribal negro through various phases to the complex musical compositions of the educated negro, a program was presented last night by Mrs. Merlin Batley at the Neighborhood Music club meeting at the La Grande hotel. She was assisted by Mrs. Leal Russell, Mrs. James McNamee, Miss Jennie Spaeth, Mrs. Leo Miller, Mrs. H. N. Ashby. The subject of Mrs. Batley's presentation was: "Negro Music as an Integral Part of American Music."

The characteristics of negro music are rhythm produced by a tom-tom effect, syncopation and emotional effects, which are very plainly marked in the simple melodies of the tribal negro, and which show in the music of the educated negro which is more complex, she said. "The Grey Wolf," which was sung by Mrs. Miller, is an example of the complicated music of the educated negro, which Mrs. Batley stated is all very tragic as if the negro were educated and sad because he knows nothing to do about it.

The musical numbers which interspersed Mrs. Batley's talk were "Deep River," by Burleigh sung by Mrs. Leal Russell; "Three Questions," by Johnson, Miss Jennie Spaeth; "Lindy Lou," Strickland, Mrs. James McNamee; "Seems Like To Me," by Johnson, Mrs. Russell; "Life and Death," Coleridge Taylor, Mrs. H. N. Ashby; "The Grey Wolf," by Burleigh, Mrs. Leo Miller.
