They used to poke fun at grandpas for wearing them, now they are cutting them down and making them over into smart little outdoor shirts for themselves.

New versions of the popular suede jackets in brown, black or cinnamon are lined throughout with white rabbit fur. Barely red and brown jackets of suede, barely reaching the waist line and are double breasted.

Stocking caps and mittens are back in style. The new caps with matching wool scarfs are gaily striped in flashy colors adding a picturesque addition to the winter ensemble.

Striped sweaters are even more popular than they were last summer. They come in brown and white, maroon and white, or brown and yellow stripes with matching stocking cap.

Bright red mittens are vivid color notes with the new navy blue corduroy skiing and skating costumes.

Suspend Portions Of Increased Rate In Eastern Class

WASHINGTON, Dec. 3 (AP)—The interstate commerce commission Wednesday suspended portions of increased eastern class freight rates which were to become effective at midnight.

The suspension was for seven months. It included the following schedules: Class and commodity rates by way of Lake Michigan and Lake Superior ports on rail and lake and rail-lake traffic both eastbound and westbound between eastern and western points.

Establishment of joint through class rates between points in official classification territory and western trunk line territory which would make inapplicable the so-called "combination rule" in making rates on plaster and plaster articles.

Rates on wool and mohair from western points to Baltimore, Boston, New York, Newport News, Norfolk and Philadelphia.

Western trunk line rates suspended included the following: Rates on iron and steel pipe and fittings between points in western trunk line territory.

Rates on potatoes in carloads between points in western trunk line territory and between points in western trunk line and Illinois territories.

Rates on excelsior and excelsior pads in carloads between points in Western trunk line and Illinois territories.

Rates on line between points in western trunk line territory. Proposed cancellation of present routings on grain and grain products in carloads between stations on the Panhandle and Santa Fe railway in Oklahoma and Memphis, Tenn., via the Panhandle and Santa Fe through Clinton, Okla., and the Chicago, Rock Island and Pacific railway.

Her entire outfit, including dress, hat, shoes and undergarments, totaled \$24.00.

Louise Morman, 17, Buchanan, Ga., won first place in the cotton school dress class with a brown and orange cotton tweed sport frock that looked like Fifth avenue. Her jaunty tam and envelop bag were of the same material. The investment in the dress was \$6.30 and in the outfit, \$18.05.

A dark brown crepe dress with a clever tan yoke won the blue ribbon in the semi-tailored silk dress class for Helen Louise Thomas 15, of Amesville, O. Her dress cost her \$5.06, and the outfit \$14.37.

Tall, slim Mary Marley, 17, from Ashland, Miss., modeled a soft flowered green chiffon voile frock and was awarded first honor in the informal party dress class. Her dress represented an outlay of \$5.92 and the outfit \$19.97. These four blue ribbon winners will be taken on a three weeks' trip next July to the major shrines of American history.

indication the Democrats won't seek control without a majority.

In the new senate they have 47 seats, to 48 for the Republicans. One is Farmer-Labor.

"If anybody wants to control my vote by a threat to take away my chairmanship of the judiciary committee. Let them do it," Norris said. "I don't say they can't. They may have the vote but I won't shed any tears if they do."

Norris did not reveal the strategy by which he believes Moses will be unseated as president pro tem, but there is every indication that he and perhaps several others will vote for another Republican rather than for the Democratic candidate.

The farm board chairman said, however, he had been unable to see how either would operate to the farmers' benefit.

"I am for anything that will help the farmers," he added. "If congress wants to put them into effect we will do our best to carry them out."

Stone said the farm board did not object to an investigation so long as the inquiry is broadened to include the grain and cotton trades as well as dealers in all other commodities.

Stone wants to see, particularly, the grain and cotton exchanges and old line companies included.

Discussing the fee and debenture, the chairman said "when you go in to any stabilization operation, it is going to cost somebody some money."

"The question is to decide who is going to pay the bills," he added. "It is going to be the United States treasury. I see no reason to change the present law."

"I believe that the sub-committee of the committee on privileges and elections of the senate will report to the full committee."

"First—That the primary plan adopted by the state Democratic committee of Alabama under which Mr. Bankhead claims to have obtained his nomination was in direct violation of the primary law of the state and was null and void as Judge Thomas of the supreme court of Alabama has already declared it was."

"Second—That the plan adopted by the committee to keep me out of the primary as a candidate for the senate to succeed myself violated the primary law of Alabama."

"Third—That the ruling of the chairman of the state Democratic committee that Democrats permitted to participate in the primary as voters could not write the name of the candidate of their choice upon the primary ballot was illegal and unlawful."
