

Egg Demand In Oregon Gaining; East Price Low

PORTLAND, Dec. 3 (AP) — Sharply lower prices for eggs in the east, destination of the bulk of the northwest lay, creates more or less apprehension among distributors in carload lots.

While there was no change in local values for the day, the break in eastern prices together with forecasts of additional cuts, gives the undertone a somewhat easier feeling.

Demand for fresh eggs locally is gaining with the decreasing quality of the storage stock. Recent sales in Portland of eggs sold to be unfit for human consumption by feeding interests, are attracting the attention of officials here. One such peddler was reported found guilty but was given another chance.

Undergrade butter continues to dominate the local market with only 30 spread between top and bottom grade. Prime firsts at 30c are the same as standards. Chain stores buy on the former basis, therefore are chiefly hit.

Market for live chickens is rather quiet here with receipts moderate since the recent cut in the buying price by some of the big killers. Much junky stuff is arriving.

Despite the occasional talk of betterment, market for apples continues to reflect a very slow and unseasonable over. With holiday shipments over, the local trade is unable to take up the slack. Prices rule weak.

Sudden stoppage of local offerings has created a famine of root vegetables here. Carrots, turnips and beets are especially scarce and prices rule higher for the limited stock. Operators unable to fill orders.

With the exception of veal, which continues a trifle slow, market for country killed meats is considered steady without general price change. Demand for bulls is still very good.

Champion Steer Brings Only \$1.27

CHICAGO, Dec. 3 (AP) — The grand champion steer of the 1931 international livestock show, "Briarcliff Thicket," was sold on the auction block today for \$1.27 a pound, the lowest price since 1923.

The prize animal, owned by Oakleigh Thorne, of New York City, weighed 1140 pounds and cost Abigail and Bastian, meat packers, of Allentown, Pa., \$1,447.80.

The champion carload of cattle, Herefords owned by J. D. Moeller, of Schiefel, Iowa, brought only \$20.25 a hundred pounds, the lowest price since 1923. The buyer was McCann and Company, merchants of Pittsburgh, Pa.

"Briarcliff Thicket" will be slaughtered for Christmas trade.

Northern California wools fairly free from defects bring 47 to 48 cents scoured basis, while the short French combing territory wools in original bags, sold at 50 to 52 cents scoured basis.

Turkey Growers In Eight States Receive Checks

SALT LAKE CITY, Dec. 3 (AP) — Checks aggregating nearly \$150,000 representing final payment on the Thanksgiving pool of the Northwest Turkey Growers association, were mailed today to state member associations.

Herbert Beyers, assistant general manager said the money will be distributed to growers in Oregon, Idaho, Colorado, Wyoming, Montana, Washington and Nevada.

Producers' net prices, he said, will be based on gross prices of 34 1/2 cents per pound for prime young birds at New York. 32 1/2 cents at Los Angeles and 32 cents in San Francisco, with freight and other expenses deducted.

The association's 1931 Thanksgiving shipments, Beyers said, totaled about 40 carloads or 800,000 pounds.

Fordham Students Honor Dead Player

NEW YORK, Dec. 3 (AP) — The student body of Fordham university today paid its final respects to the memory of Cornelius Murphy Jr., of Greenfield, Mass., varsity tackle who died yesterday as a result of football injuries, in a solemn requiem mass in the college chapel.

The entire enrollment, 1500 students, crowded the chapel as Father Aloysius Hogan, president of the university, eulogized the dead player and chanted the prayers for the dead.

The body was sent to Greenfield for burial.

Two Railroads Lose Valley, Siletz Fight

WASHINGTON, Dec. 3 (AP) — The fight between the Southern Pacific and the Oregon Electric Railway for possession of the prosperous Valley and Siletz railroad ended today with refusal by the interstate commerce commission to let either line purchase it.

The Southern Pacific petition was turned down because the commission found there was nothing in the record to show the present owners of the Valley and Siletz were willing to sell to that company.

The Oregon Electric was denied a permit to purchase because the price of \$2,000,000 offered was held unjustified and because all points the Oregon Electric now serves are fully served by the Southern Pacific.

Eastern Railroads Collect New Rates

WASHINGTON, Dec. 3 (AP) — Eastern railroads and lines in western trunk line territory today began collecting increased freight rates on many commodities.

The rates went into effect at midnight. The only exceptions were about a dozen items or groups of rates affecting a few points and products which the interstate commerce commission suspended late yesterday for seven months to investigate further.
