Good steers sold Monday at \$6.75 with heifers \$5.75 and cows \$4.50. Later in week nominal quotations were \$6.25, \$6.25 and \$4.50 respectively. After Monday trade was scarcely sufficient to establish prices. Common to thin steers were down to \$4.00 and less, while cutter to good bulls were \$2.75 @ \$3.00; vealers and calves were \$3.50 @ \$7.00.

Hogs 4634 for week. Trade started with an advance of around 75c Monday, but final prices showed the loss of all but 25c of this in slaughter stuff. Light butchers scaled \$5.75 general Monday, but Tuesday and thereafter the general trend was not above \$5.35. Heavyweights were around \$5.25 @ \$5.50 with packing sows \$4.00 @ \$4.25; slaughter \$4.50 @ \$5.25; feeder pigs were steady at \$4.00 @ \$4.50.

WINE WEAKER IN EGG MART; PRICES SAME

PORTLAND, Dec. 5 (AP) — Further sharp cuts in the price of eggs at midwest and eastern points have at last effected values along the coast and especially in California. Conditions generally throughout the country are easier as a result of extremely good weather in most sections with consequent holding up of the lay.

While local prices were not changed for the weekend, according to E. J. Dixon, general manager of the Pacific co-ops, the situation appears weaker all around as a result of the sharp cuts elsewhere. Portland is one of the few cities wherein the quotations represent actual selling prices for the bulk of the supplies. Some points quote high prices and sell little at that; the bulk of their offerings

going below so-called established values.

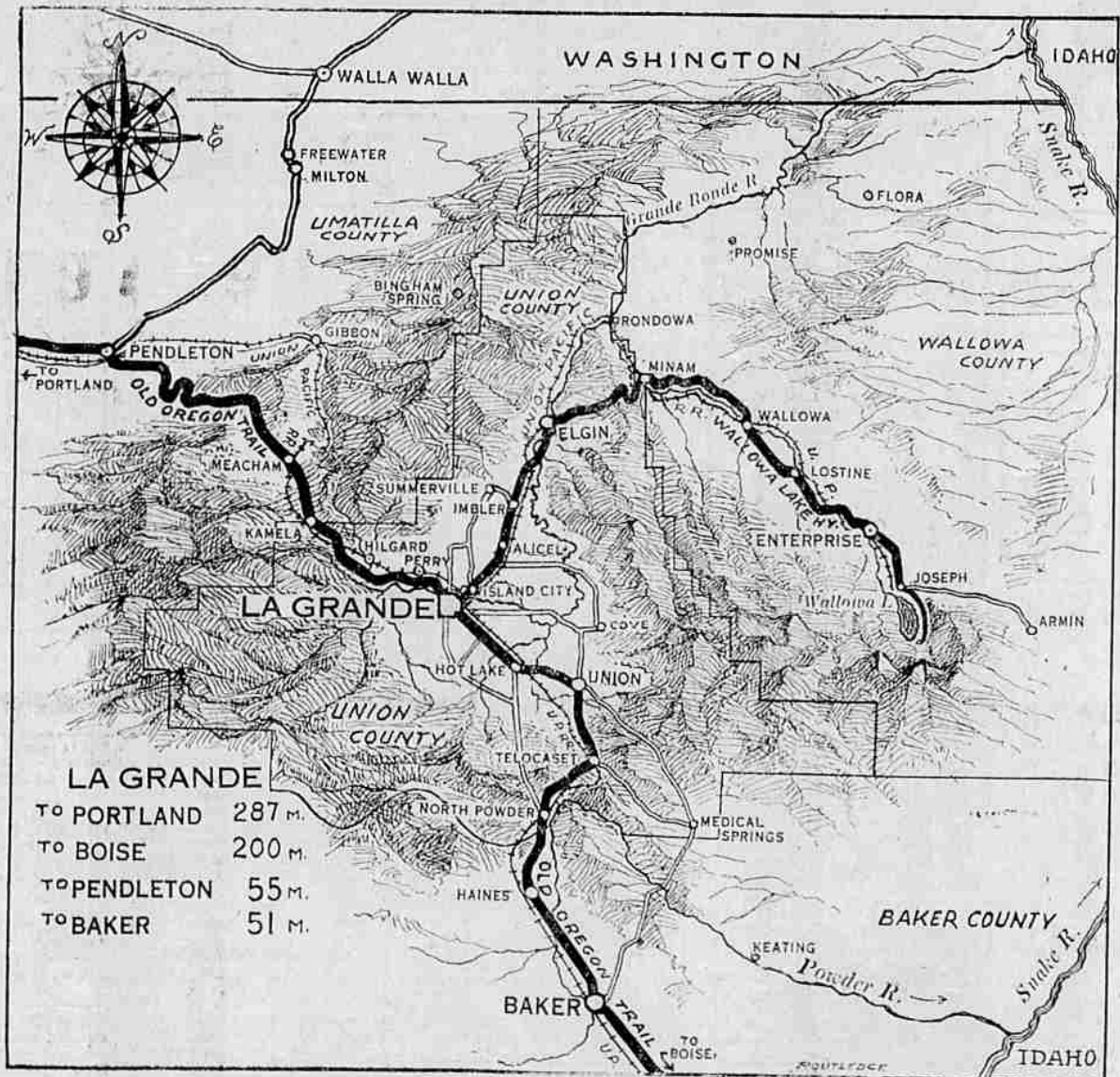
Offering of undergrade eggs to the Portland trade by some outsiders has hurt the situation here and may affect quotations. Authorities of the city are reported on the job, however.
