Neighborhood Art Club in Meeting

Mrs. Jennie Thompson and Mrs. H. H. Cleaver presented two different phases of art yesterday afternoon before the Neighborhood Art club at 2 o'clock at the La Grande hotel. Mrs. Thompson discussed the practical house of today and the latter the history of the art of painting.

Delphian Society Continuing Study

With Miss Sarah Williamson as leader, members of the Delphian society took up the study of Sienese and Venetian painting at their meeting Tuesday evening at 7:30 in the card room of the Sacajawea Inn.

In discussing the school of Siena, Mrs. Lowell Williamson contrasted the work of Duccio, Siena's leading painter, with the work of Giotto, of Florence. These men were contemporaries. She stated that the dramatic force and expressive line of Giotto to use wholly lacking in the graceful delicately featured figures of Duccio.

Mrs. E. E. Hurley explained Duccio's masterpiece, "The Majesty" done for the cathedral in Siena, also "The Rucellai Madonna" in Santa Maria Novella, formerly attributed to Cimabue.

Mrs. Beatrice Young spoke on the Venetian school of painting, stating that it was color more than form that led to the imagination of the Venetians. Sculpture was never very popular in Venice.

Mrs. Huguette Brady, speaking of early Venetian painters, mentioned Gentile Bellini, his more gifted brother, Giovanni Bellini and Carpaccio, painter of the famous St. Ursula series.

Miss Henri Herring explained two pictures by Gentile Bellini, "Portrait of Sultan Mehmet II" and "Procession of the Holy Cross." She also spoke of Giovanni Bellini's "Portrait of Doge Loredano" in the national gallery and "The Vision of St. Ursula" from the St. Ursula series by Carpaccio.

Miss Ida McMeekin told of the life and influence of the popular and gifted Giorgione, and Miss Hilda Anthony closed the study period with an explanation of two of Giorgione's great pictures, "Sleeping Venus" and "Madonna and Child With Saint Francis and Saint Libera."

Under the leadership of Miss Williamson, the group will continue the study of Venetian painting at the next meeting, to be held Dec. 15.

ADMINISTRATION TAX WOULD APPLY ON 1931 INCOMES

be graduated up to 37 per cent on incomes between \$100,000 and \$200,000 and reach 40 per cent on incomes in excess of \$200,000.

Personal exemption for heads of families would be decreased \$1,000, becoming \$2,500. The single person exemption would be reduced \$500, becoming \$1,000. For each dependent \$400 exemption would be allowed.

The earned income provision of present law, under which 25 per cent of the tax is credited, would be continued.

A half per cent would be added to the 12 per cent corporation levy of now, and the \$3,000 exemption provision eliminated. It was estimated this would bring in \$87,000,000 by the end of next fiscal year.

The recommendations on miscellaneous taxes were: "An increase of one-sixth in the present rates on tobacco manufactures and products except cigars; an increase of 1 cent in the existing stamp tax upon sales of transfers of capital stock; extension of the present tax on admissions through the reduction of the present automobiles, trucks, and accessories at

5, 3 and 2 1/2 per cent, respectively; a stamp tax on conveyances of realty of 50 cents for each \$500 of value in excess of \$100; a tax of 5 per cent on manufacturers sales of radio and phonograph equipment and accessories; a stamp tax of two cents on each check and draft; and a tax on telephone, telegraph, cable, and radio messages of 5 cents for charges in the amount in excess of 50 cents."

Heavy Deficit Likely

The secretary estimated the 1931-33 period, under the present circumstances, would see a \$4,440,000,000 deficit and the public debt lifted \$3,250,000,000.

He set up these three objectives for the legislation:

Substantially to reduce this fiscal year's deficit, provision of adequate revenue to meet current expenses next year, and to balance the budget for the 1934 fiscal period.

No specific postal rate increase was proposed. Mr. Mellon only asked that it be sufficient to return \$150,000,000 more annually, to offset the post office deficit.

Seconds Hoover's Warning

At the same time he seconded President Hoover's warning against increased federal obligations, in these words:

"Additional expenditures for objects in themselves most meritorious should be judged in the light of the further burden which they would place upon the economy of the nation and upon the public credit at a time of unusual difficulty."

"The taxpayer is asked to assume a large additional burden. He is entitled to know that the government on its part is so conducting its business as not to demand of him anything more than is actually necessary. The government is not an entity apart from the life of the peo-

ple and it has no money to spend except what it gets from the pockets of the people. The treasury cannot of itself create funds. Whatever it spends must be obtained either through taxation or through the sale of government securities, and the securities in the end must be redeemed by taxes. There is a limit to the extent to which the government, under our social and economic structure, may wisely divert funds from private employment to governmental use. When we take into consideration the mounting burden of state and local taxes, it is no exaggeration to say that we are approaching that limit."

May Still Be Polluted

The bureau of agricultural engineering says that the mere fact that winter is cold, appears clear and tastes all right is not sufficient evidence to indicate that it may not be polluted by disease germs.

THREE-DAY HOLIDAY

SALEM, Dec. 9 (P) — Employees in the department of state will receive a three-day holiday over Christmas. It was announced today by Hal E. Hoss, secretary of state, it is expected other departments will follow the same procedure.

Christmas this year falls on Friday, and since most employees work only a half-day Saturday's the actual additional holiday amounts to a half day, Hoss said.

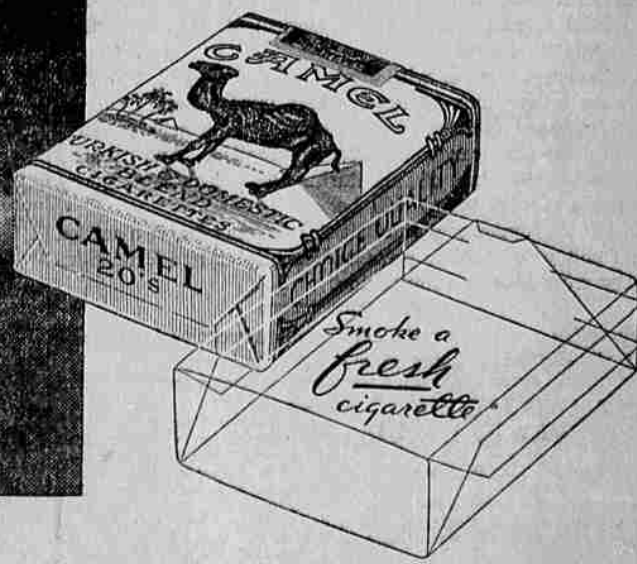
