HOOVER ASKS FOR VOTE ON MORATORIUM

American relations with much of the rest of the world. It ranged from Manchuria to Mexico, and from the St. Lawrence waterway to Paraguay. The president again urged adherence to the world court, and vigorous action by the world at large to curb armaments.

"No discouragements should be permitted to turn the world from sane reasonable limitations of arms," he said.

The president asked legislative sanction for the moratorium within the next five days, for it is on Dec. 15 that the next payments from abroad fall due.

He suggested provision for payment of the installments withheld over a ten-year period, beginning July 1, 1933.

Against Cancellation
His statement of last spring that "I do not approve in any remote sense of the cancellation of the debts to us," was repeated.

"The effect of this (moratorium) agreement," the president wrote, "was instantaneous in reversing the drift toward general economic panic and has served to give time to the peoples of those countries to readjust

senate today adopted without debate the Johnson resolution directing inquiry into the amounts of foreign securities in this country.

The investigation was ordered as President Hoover's message on the one year moratorium on intergovernmental debts was delivered in the senate.

Senator Johnson called for the inquiry as a part of his contest against the debt holiday.

The resolution directs the senate finance committee "to investigate the sale, flotation and allocation by banks, banking institutions, corporations or individuals of foreign bonds or securities in the United States."

Johnson intends to have leading international bankers called. He has mentioned such persons as J. P. Morgan and Albert Wiggin.

Immediately after adoption of the Johnson proposal, Senator Smoot of Utah, chairman of the finance committee, introduced a bill to ratify the moratorium.

More votes than necessary for ratification already have been pledged Mr. Hoover.
