Year's Earnings Of Dairymen At Five Per Cent

CORVALLIS, Ore. (AP)—Oregon dairymen earned an average of 5 per cent on their investment, wages for the work done by their families and a slight additional profit during the year ending last April 1.

These earnings were revealed by preliminary figures for the second year of the three-year cost production survey released by the farm management and dairy departments of the experiment station here.

The survey included 14 dairy farms and pointed out that while many were considerably above the average in earnings, others were below.

Because of lower feed prices and lower wages, production costs dropped approximately 20 per cent during the year. This partly compensated for the reduced prices of dairy products. Reduced to a butterfat basis, the average price received by dairymen for their products was 41 cents a pound, or one cent above the production cost. If wages and interest are included in the latter.

Irrigated sections of Eastern Oregon showed the lowest production cost, averaging five cents a pound less than the coastal regions and seven cents a pound less than the Willamette valley. The valley, however, had a superior outlet for fluid milk and disposed of more than one-third of the total production. Irrigated pastures and relatively cheap alfalfa hay were cited as Eastern Oregon's advantages.

The three-year research is a federal Purnell project. It is being conducted by H. W. Selby, A. S. Burrier, and G. A. Kuhlman of the farm management department, and by F. M. Brandt, I. R. Jones and R. W. Morse of the dairy department.
